Public Welfare Committee Seeks to Conserve Human Resources

"Now that we are a nation at war, it is more important than ever to work towards conservation of our human resources." This principle was agreed upon at the December meeting of the Allegany County Public Welfare Committee of the State Charities Aid Association. Dr. A. E. McGuire, chairman of the Public Welfare Committee led the discussion which followed the reports made on the various activities of the committee. One of the most significant reports given was that by Mrs. Knight Thornton of Wellsville who outlined the progress being made by the sub-committee on the Child Welfare Services in organizing local committees to discuss in forum groups the resources for children in the community. The State Charities Aid Association has drawn up an outline which is being used by these forum groups in guiding their analysis of health, education, recreation, housing and religious resources for children in a community. To date committees have been organized in the following localities: Alfred-Almond: Mrs. M. E. Kenyon, chairman; Mrs. A. E. McGuire, co-chairman; Mrs. W. H. Genne, secretary. Andover: Miss Dorothea Snyder, chairman. Hume, Rushford, Belfast and Caneadea: Andrew Haynes, chairman. In the town of Wellsville, George Jammèr, superintendent of schools is presenting the project to the local P. T. A. Council as a possible program for their consideration.

Study the New State Law

THE NEW VEHICLE SAFETY-RESPONSIBILITY LAW AT A GLANCE

Editor's Note: This is the third of a series of articles prepared in collaboration with the Bureau of Motor Vehicles explaining the New Motor Vehicle Safety-Responsibility Law, which goes into effect January 1. Today's article explains restrictions concerning the re-registration of a car and provisions for the release of security and proof of financial responsibility.) It is important to remember that under the new Safety-Responsibility Law if the registration certificate and plates of a motor vehicle are suspended for failure to satisfy a judgment or confession of judgment or for failure to post security when required following an accident, the motor vehicle in question cannot again be registered in this state by anyone unless requirements of the law are first met by the person whose license was suspended. This means that if a person sells his car, or transfers it to another member of his family or anyone else, after losing his registration privileges for any of the reasons named, the new owner will not be able to obtain registration plates in this state for the car. There are three classes of persons exempt from this provision, as follows: (1) a receiver in bankruptcy or a trustee in bankruptcy appointed under the laws of the United States; (2) the holder of a lien or mortgage upon the car, taken before January 1, 1942, or any person claiming title from such lien holder or mortgagee; and (3) a judgment debtor who has recovered a judgment in any action resulting from the accident on account of which the vehicle's registration was suspended. Another provision of the law states that when the owner of a motor vehicle, who is required to give proof of future financial responsibility, files a certificate showing that any car or cars owned by him are insured, but that he is not insured while driving another's car, it will be unlawful for him to operate a vehicle owned by anyone be-

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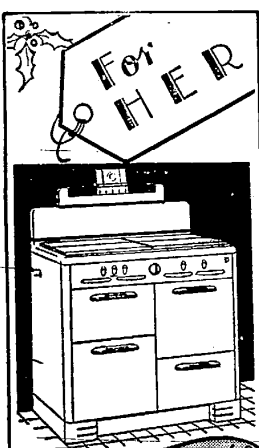
shows himself. This restriction must appear on his driver's license. He will be relieved of this restriction, however, if he files a certificate showing that he has obtained an operator's policy of liability insurance. This type of policy is all the proof required of a person who becomes subject to the law but does not own a car. The law specifies that security deposited with the Commissioner of Motor Vehicles following an accident may be used only for the payment of a judgment against the person making the deposit, for damages arising out of the accident for which the security was posted. The deposit, or any balance of it, will be returned to the depositor after the expiration of one year from the date of the accident, provided the Commissioner of Motor Vehicles is given reasonable evidence that no action is pending and no judgment, or any part of one, remains unsatisfied, in connection with the accident. Any bond given as proof of financial responsibility for the future will be cancelled; a certificate of insurance, cash or securities posted for the same purpose will be returned, and the requirements for filing proof of financial responsibility for the future will be waived, on request, in any one of the following circumstances: (1) Death of the person on whose behalf the proof was filed; (2) Permanent incapacity of such person to operate a motor vehicle; (3) Surrender by such person of his driver's license and registration certificates and plates. However, proof will not be released if an action for damages is pending, or a judgment is outstanding and unsatisfied, or if the Commissioner has received notice that
