Study the New State Law

The principal penalty for non-compliance with provisions of the Motor Vehicle Safety-Responsibility (2) Motor vehicles subject to the motor vehicle Safety-Kesponsibility
Law is the suspension of driving and
registration privileges, as explained
in earlier articles of this series.
These are forfeited until the offending operators or owners comply.
If a person who has neither license

The law will not apply to selfinsurers. A self-insurer, within the meaning of the law, is a person having registered in his name in this state more than 25 motor vehicles. if such a person obtains from the Commissioner of Motor Vehicles a certificate of self-insurance. The Commissioner is authorized to issue a certificate of self-insurance, in his discretion, if he is reasonably satisfied the applicant is and will continue to be able to pay any judg-ment for damage. A certificate of self-insurance may be cancelled following notice and hearing.
