**Carl Clarke Herd Makes Big Record**

Brattleboro, Vt., Jan. 6.—Carl V. Clarke, Andover, owns 12 registered Holstein cows that produced enough milk during the past test year to provide 58 families with four quarts of milk daily for the entire year. The herd average was 522 pounds butterfat from 15,109 pounds of milk per cow.

This butterfat average is nearly three times as much as that of the country's average dairy cow, using U. S. Department of Agriculture statistics as the basis of comparison. Eight members of this Holstein herd were milked two times daily, the remainder three times.

The highest producer in the herd was Hillview Butter Girl Colantha, an eight-year-old that produced 741 pounds of butterfat from 23,422 pounds of milk in 332 days.

The production records obtained by having these cows on test will be useful in planning a breeding program for the further improvement of the herd.

Testing was supervised by The Holstein-Friesian Association of America, Brattleboro, Vt., in cooperation with Cornell University, Ithaca.

Approximately 15,000 registered Holsteins are being tested under the association's herd improvement registry plan.

**Farm Security Administration Expanding Activity**

**Will Make Loans to Small Farmers in This Section. Maximum Production Demanded.**

To help small farmers enlist their services 100 per cent in the Food and Freedom program the Farm Security Administration is expanding its activities, Maynard C. Poray, FSA supervisor for the Farm Security Administration announced today. In addition to its regular activities, Farm Security will make a limited number of loans to enable low-income farmers to repair their buildings and bring them to an efficient and livable condition. In cases where farms are too small to support the family, loans will also be made to increase farm acreage.

"For some time," Mr. Poray said, "Farm Security has realized that there are a large number of small farmers living on farms with buildings too poor and fields too small to support the farm family. With the nation at war and with maximum production demanded of every farm family, those conditions can no longer be allowed to exist."

In this part of the country the start of the farm and home improvement loans will be made in southern New York and the northern half of Pennsylvania. The loans will carry three per cent interest and the amount of the loan as well as the number of years allowed for repayment will depend on the productive ability of the farm. In general loans will be limited to a maximum of \$3,500. Like other FSA loans they will be made only to families unable to obtain adequate credit elsewhere. "Like all Farm Security Loans, these new farm and home improvement loans will be accompanied by a farm and home plan. This plan made out by the farm family with the help of the FSA supervisors will provide for home production of a major part of the families' food supply.

It will also stress increased production of milk and other products needed to win the war," Mr. Poray said. "We hope that by fixing up their homes and barns, by bringing

their farms up into the family type class, and by following a sound farm and home plan, small farm families will be able to improve their health, carry their share of taxes and other community responsibilities, and contribute their full share to the war effort."

After buildings and land have been raised to minimum standards, it will be possible to use a portion of the farm and home improvement loan to refinance existing debts. However, the debts must first be adjusted down to a value in line with the productive ability of the farm.
