## ASK The Scientist

If you have a question to ask the scientists, mail it to the New York Press Association, The Castle, Syracuse, N. Y. The Science Board of the Radio Workshop at Syracuse University will answer each week in the Andover News those questions considered most interesting and timely.

Question — Since the United States has taken over Dutch Guinea our attention has been called to bauxite mines which American soldiers are now protecting. Why do we have to get this ore of aluminum from foreign sources?

Answer — When you consider that aluminum makes up 8 per cent of the substances of the earth's crust, it does seem strange that we have to go as far away as Dutch Guinea or anywhere beyond our own backyard to get the ore from which aluminum is extracted. But we have to do it because we depend upon nature to make the first separation, the breaking down of the rock so that the aluminum is accessible to us. We could get aluminum out of clay of which aluminum is a significant constituent, but that would cost more than we could afford. As long as we can get the bauxite in this country, and most of it, about 65 per cent, came from Dutch Guinea. Dr. Apfel, geologist.
