### Toxoid Clinic In Andover Feb. 5th

A toxoid clinic in charge of Dr. S. B. Scott, Andover health officer, will be held at the Andover Central School next Thursday afternoon, Feb. 5th at 3 o'clock, as a part of a county drive sponsored by the long range health and preparedness committee of the County Defense Council of which Dr. Philip Morrison of Bolivar is chairman.

The objective of these clinics which are being held throughout the county is to make the county and its individual children safe from diphtheria.

Dr. Morrison states that the State Department of Health has determined that 35 per cent of the children between six months and five years of age immunized against diphtheria will make any community reasonably secure against an outbreak of the disease.

"However," he said, "altho this will protect a community, nothing will protect the individual child except actual immunization treatment. I want to call upon the parents and guardians of the young children in our community to take advantage of the special opportunities that will be offered them during this campaign to see that their children have the simple protective treatment."

"The State supplies us with toxoid, the latest scientific agent for immunization, and the treatment itself is simple and sure. No mother need have anything to fear from the treatment of her children with toxoid. On the other hand, she may have everything to fear from a terrible disease if she fails to see that her child is protected."

### February Tire Quotas Cut

A total of 87 new tires and 129 new tubes will be available in Allegany county during February according to Alwin Schaller, tire administrator. The January quota for the county was 135 tires and 112 tubes.
