Pupils Have Good Regents Record

Over 90 Per Cent Have Passing Marks

Altho relatively few pupils take Regents examinations in January and many are those who have once failed the examinations, a study of the results in Andover Central School shows that a high percentage of local pupils passed the State examinations.

In the high school Regents 27 papers were written and 25 of them or 92.6 were given passing marks. In the junior high school department 106 preliminary Regents papers were written and of this number 98 received passing marks, making the per cent of passing 92.5.

PURPLE PANTHERS UPSET WHITESVILLE BY SCORE OF 30-24

Move Into First Place Tie

A determined Purple and White team led by "Ship" Karcaneas and "Stan" Ruger overpowered a strong Whitesville club 30-24 last Friday evening and moved into a first place tie with Whitesville.

The locals played one of their best games of the year in this win. They played and worked together as a team, during the first half Whitesville was completely baffled by the locals' fine passing and offensive work.

The locals started off the scoring at the beginning of the game and held a 16-9 lead at halftime. It was during the third quarter however, that our passing attack bogged down and Whitesville moved up to within three points of us at the end of the third quarter. With a last determined smash, Andover dropped in nine points at the beginning of the final quarter while Whitesville was held to six, four of which were dropped in at the final minutes of play, but were too late and not enough to count.

"Slip" Karcaneas and Stan Ruger together dropped in 26 of Andover's 30 points, 13 points each. "Naze" Dolan and Gorsuch accounted for the remainder.

Stan scored six field goals and a foul shot for his total while "Slip" Karcaneas was dropping them in from all around the basket; he scored four field goals and five free throws out of seven tries for his total.

A deciding factor in this win was the locals' accuracy on the foul line compared with their opponents'. Andover made six out of 14 fouls compared with Whitesville's four out of 19. Another deciding factor was Stan Ruger and "Chuck" Holt's back board work from which Andover had control of the ball a considerable share of the time.

This win, altho an important one, proved also to be a very costly one. Stan Ruger suffered a badly sprained ankle which will probably keep him out of uniform for at least two weeks. Stan will probably miss the Allentown game tonight besides the Alfred-Almond and Scio games the following week and possibly a lot longer.
