Andover May Have Defense School

Central School May Be Approved For Auto Mechanics and Metal Work Courses

Communications with the State Education Department and the Office of Defense Training Programs are now in progress seeking approval for Federal supported courses in auto mechanics and metal work in Andover Central School for out-of-school young men in this area.

Each course will run for ten weeks and instruction will occupy 15 hours per week. The courses will be given by an expert mechanic and the program will be supervised by Mr. Fribolin, agricultural shop instructor of Andover Central School.

The courses are designed particularly for young men on farms between the ages of 17 and 24, although others who desire the work will also be admitted. The work will include repair, maintenance and operation of tractors, trucks, and other farm machinery. Welding and sheet metal work will also be included.

Air Raid Practice Held

Friday morning the students of ACS had their first air raid practice. At 9:05 the alarm rang—five rings on the classroom bell.

The students marched from their rooms into specially designated corridors on the ground floor.

All those in the east wing marched down to the lower east wing corridors. All those in the west wing marched down to the lower west wing corridor. Those in the cafeteria, music room, homemaking room and rooms 211, 212, 213, 214 and 215 marched down to the corridor outside the cafeteria.

The air raid practices will be held every week until all the students are familiar with the procedure. After that they will be held only occasionally.

SCIO HOLDS LOCALS TO 25-23 WIN LAST FRIDAY

The Purple Panthers of Andover Central School just eked out their sixth league victory last Friday night by two points. The locals held a 9-6 lead as the first quarter ended.

However, from there on they played ragged ball and did not make a point in the second quarter. Scio began to hit the hoop during the first half and led at half-time 10-9.

In the second half, "Pepper" Ryan and "Naze" Dolan began to throw them in from out in front. However, Scio matched the locals, basket for basket, and, with two minutes remaining to play, the score was 23-21, in favor of Scio.

At this point "Naze" Dolan threw in two baskets that gave the Panthers the victory just before the final whistle blew. This leaves Andover still in a tie for leadership with Whitesville. The locals have to beat Richburg, while Whitesville has to get by Allentown only.

"Pepper" Ryan and "Naze" Dolan were the offensive spearhead for the Purple and White, scoring 18 of the 25 points. "Pepper" tallied ten and "Naze" made eight.

Potter and Farwell were high for Scio with nine and eight points respectively.

WILDCATS WHITE-WASH SCIO JUVENILES BY 33 TO 4 SCORE

The Wildcats of Andover Central School really went on the prowl last Friday night and came home with a 33-4 victory.

The outcome of the game was never in doubt from the opening whistle. At half-time the locals were well ahead with an 18-0 lead. This lead was increased in the second half and the locals coasted to an easy victory.

Ludden, Shellman and Driscoll were high for the locals, each tossing in eight points. Jim played his usual outstanding game at guard, as well as his offensive eight points.

ALF-ALM. JAYVEES TROUNCE WILDCATS TO TUNE OF 33-18

The Alfred-Almond second team ran up its win streak to eight consecutive games without a loss this season, at the expense of the local Wildcats.

The visitors went into a lead of 5-4 at the end of the first quarter and were not headed afterwards. The locals played a hard offensive game but were overpowered by the stronger club. Alfred-Almond made most of their counters on fast breaks to "Chuck" Robinson, their star forward.

Robinson was high scorer for the evening, hitting the bucket for 16 points.

"Jim" Driscoll and Dick Ludden were outstanding for the locals.

PURPLE PANTHERS DROP THRILLER TO A-A BY 27-24

The locals bowed before a favored Alfred-Almond team last Tuesday evening on the local hardwood by a close 27-24 score. This marked the second time this year that the Panthers have been defeated by the larger school.

This proved to be an outstanding game and was witnessed by a majority crowd from both schools.

Andover matched their opponents, basket for basket, thruout the entire game and never remained far behind, going as far as to draw even with them a couple of times, but never going ahead. Alfred-Almond led at every quarter but never by over three points. Andover held them to a 7-4 quarter score, 15-14 half-time score and 20-18 at the three-quarter mark.

This loss makes it three out of twelve for the Purple and White this year, two losses to Alfred-Almond and one to Whitesville. This loss to Alfred-Almond broke Andover's win streak at seven straight.

The locals showed up with some fine passing and good teamwork and also dropped in some difficult shots from all over the court. Andover played this game with two of their first team players out with injuries, Stan Ruger and "Slip" Karcanes.

"Slip" was out with a knee injury and Stan with a broken ankle.

"Naze" Dolan proved to be the local scoring threat, dropping in four baskets and a free throw, for a nine total. "Chuck" Holt also was high in the scoring column with eight points.

"Chuck" Ferguson took over the evening's scoring honors for Alfred-Almond with 12 points. Fran Crossett, high scoring Alfred-Almond forward, was closely guarded and could only account for seven points. In their pre-season encounter with Andover, Crossett scored 18 points and Ferguson scored 13 points for Alfred-Almond in registering a 41-34 win over the Purple and White.
