## Instructions For Control of Incendiary Bombs

The following instructions, released by the Andover Fire Department pertaining to incendiary bombs and fires should be carefully studied by all:

Altho some people still believe in the saying that "it can't happen here" events of the past few weeks have proven otherwise. No one knows just when or where they may be in a building struck by incendiary bombs, but by being prepared and being able to keep cool and fight the blaze and bomb, no serious damage should result.

The incendiary or magnesium bomb is practically impossible to extinguish and water is the only safe and certain way of bringing these bombs under control. Many commercial fire extinguishers, adaptable for smothering or extinguishing incipient fires are worthless against incendiary bombs as the burning bomb when struck by a stream from these extinguishers will not only explode more violently but give off a poisonous gas that will make it impossible to remain in the vicinity of the bomb. A pail of sand, in which to lift the burning bomb and a long-handled shovel, besides your garden hose, stirrup pump or pack-pump outfit are the main implements to successfully bring these bombs under control.

In the near future the Andover firemen will demonstrate control of these bombs and moving pictures of actually fighting fire and bomb will be shown.

The instructions important to all and which should be memorized are as follows:

- Be Sure You—**
- 1—Be sure you can get to the bomb by stairway or ladder.
  - 2—Be sure you always have bath tubs and pails filled with water and a hose tap connection in the house.
  - 3—Be sure you have a garden hose with an adjustable nozzle and a stirrup pump or pack pump outfit and a long-handled shovel, dark glasses, old leather gloves, a powerful flashlight and a plywood or metal shield.
  - 4—Be sure you definitely locate the bomb's position.
  - 5—Be sure you use only water spray on the bomb. Careful application of spray will reduce burning time of bomb from 15 to 5 minutes.
  - 6—Be sure you search for remaining fires in the area where the bomb has rested and on the floors below.
  - 7—Be sure you open windows to allow smoke to escape.
  - 8—Be sure you clear unused garrets and top floors of all stored burnable material.
  - 10—Be sure you realize that a few bombs may contain a small explosive charge. Incendiary bombs

are generally safe to approach two minutes, after impact.

- Do Not—**
- 1—Do not lock interior doors.
  - 2—Do not depend solely upon public water supply.
  - 3—Do not keep your fire fighting equipment in inaccessible places.
  - 4—Do not get above the fire area.
  - 5—Do not hit the bomb with a solid stream of water and do not use commercial extinguishers unless approved by your fire department.
  - 6—Do not be satisfied when the bomb is burned out. Search carefully for hidden fire.
  - 7—Do not be without light and air.
  - 8—Do not become frightened and leave the building—fight the fire.
  - 9—Do not neglect good fire prevention housekeeping.
  - 10—Do not fear incendiary bombs—respect them—keep cool. Where possible advance upon an incendiary bomb behind a shield of plywood or metal.

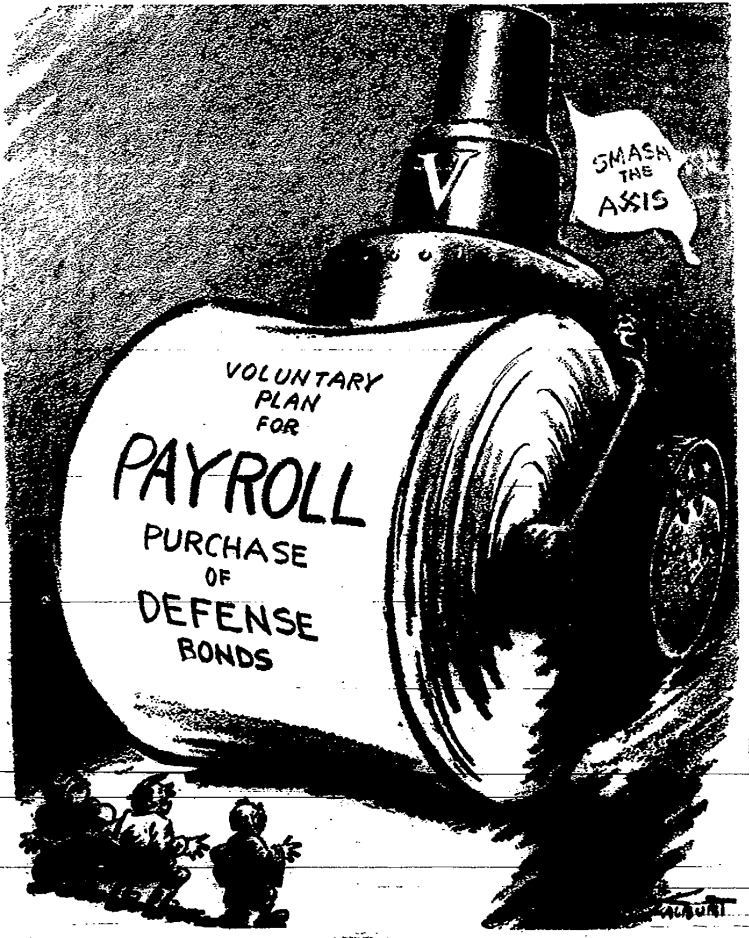

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## Issue Lenten Regulations For Catholics

Rev. Charles J. Keller of the Blessed Sacrament church received the following Lenten regulations for Catholics, which in effect for the duration of the Lenten season, which begins on Ash Wednesday, Feb. 17, and ends on Holy Saturday, April 19, 1942.

- 1.—In virtue of the law of the Holy Father, the law of Lent is dispensed for all Catholics and the law of abstinence is to the extent that Catholics are bound to abstain from flesh and its juices only on Friday, Wednesday, the forenoon Saturday and the Vigils of Holy Saturday, daily perform the Way of the Cross.
- 2.—In place of the fast, Catholics are exhorted to practice other penance, such as abstaining from intoxicating drink, daily at Holy Mass, daily reciting the Rosary, daily visits to the Blessed Sacrament, daily performing the Way of the Cross.
- 3.—It is respectfully urged that Catholics carry out the special devotions held in churches, and by frequenting the Sacraments of Penance and Eucharist.
- 4.—Charity to our neighbors should also be a part of our Lenten observance. The prayer of the Holy Father is that the Lenten season should be a regular private and public devotion of the money saved by the Lenten observance, given to comfort the distressed.
- 5.—Dances, card parties, entertainments for the church, Catholic organizations or are hereby strictly forbidden during this season.
- 6.—The time for the observance of the Easter Duty: from Sunday of Lent, Feb. 22, to Sunday, May 31, inclusive.
- 7.—While marriages are permitted during Lent, the Nuptial blessing are forbidden.
- 8.—Catholics who are members of National Defense work after midnight, in the facilities granted by the Holy Father for the duration of the Lenten season, are to receive Holy Communion under the following conditions:
  - 1.—They must abstain from food for at least four hours before Holy Communion.
  - 2.—They must abstain from food for at least one hour before Holy Communion.
  - 3.—They must abstain from alcoholic liquids from midnight.
