Vegetable shortcake is almost good enough for a dessert and may mean calls for "seconds", especially if bright colored vegetables are used to make it.

Vegetable Shortcake
2 cups of a colorful vegetable.
1 1/2 cups of white sauce.
Hard cooked eggs.
Cheese.

Place the vegetable in a casserole and cover it with hard cooked egg slices; pour the white sauce over it and sprinkle grated cheese on top. Bake at 350 degrees F. for about 30 minutes, or until the mixture bubbles on top.

Suggested menu:
Vegetable shortcake, endive salad with French dressing, buttered wholewheat muffins, gingerbread, milk at least for the children, and tea, coffee or milk for the adults.
