New Anemia Cure Sighted

National defense health authorities have been informed of an unbelievable local medical discovery that promises to cure anemia and actually put redder blood into the veins of Americans by the rubbing of a potent substance into the human skin. In brief, a preparation has been developed which reports from physicians and laboratories indicate will make it possible for the first time for anemic patients to absorb a very highly concentrated liver extract directly through their skins. Such a revolutionary method would obviate the somewhat painful hypodermic injections of liver extract as well as the eating of huge amounts of raw and uncooked liver and liver capsules. The new technique, said to have been used with amazingly successful results on more than 50 human beings and on scores of dogs, consists only in rubbing some 20 drops of a creamy fluid into the skin of the thigh or stomach. After less than a minute of massaging, the skin area is left dry and unstained.

Evaporated Milk

With the ready availability of evaporated milk some one has asked "Can evaporated milk be soured?" Yes, it may be done. Vinegar or lemon juice does the trick in this case the same as with sweet whole milk. For sour milk, add 1 tablespoon of vinegar or lemon juice to 1/2 cup evaporated milk mixed with 1/2 cup of water. To produce sour cream, add 1 tablespoon of vinegar or lemon juice to 1 cup of evaporated milk as it comes from the can. In baking use 1/2 teaspoon of soda for each cup of sour cream or milk. If you are substituting sour milk or cream for sweet, figure that the 1/2 teaspoon of soda replaces 2 teaspoons of baking powder in leavening power. If your sweet milk recipe should call for 1 cup of milk and 3 teaspoons of baking powder, you may use 1 cup of sour milk, 1/2 teaspoon of soda and 1 teaspoon of baking powder.

Indians Want Treaty Restored

Seventy-five years ago, the Go-shute Indians from western Utah were granted a treaty, details of which include that white men would keep out of lands reserved to the Indians, if they (Indians) would not molest the white men's building railroads and telegraphs over the hunting grounds. Recently a spokesman for the tribe came into a Salt Lake City court to protect the land of his fathers from encroachment of white men. It is claimed that white men have failed to observe hunting and fishing rights granted the tribe in the 75-year-old treaty. The tribe appeared puzzled over the edict of game officers that they must buy hunting and fishing licenses. Chief Little Moon declared that the game, fish and fowls will be better protected if the Indian has the right to hunt every day in the year than by the white man hunting and fishing just in seasons. "Because the Indians do not destroy like the white man."

YOUR FEDERAL INCOME TAX

\$100 or more during the calendar year 1941.

All persons or organizations acting at any time during the year 1941 as broker or other agent in stock, bond, or commodity transactions (including banks which handle clearing orders for depositors or custodian accounts) are required to file annual returns of information on Form 1100 with respect to all customers, depositors, or accounts for whom or which the total amount of the sales of securities or commodities, or the total market value of the securities exchanged, is \$25,000 or more during the calendar year 1941 and each subsequent calendar year, with certain exceptions. A separate Form 1100 must be prepared for each customer, depositor, or account for whom or which business was transacted during the year and must show the name and address and other information provided for in the form.

Information returns are carefully checked with individual returns of taxpayers. Thousands of delinquent returns and additional revenue amounting to millions of dollars have been secured as the result of the examination of information returns.

When, Where and How Taxes Are to Be Paid

Taxes due on a return filed for the calendar year 1941 may be paid in full at the time of the filing of the return or before March 16, 1942. The tax may, at the option of the taxpayer, be paid in four equal installments instead of in a single payment, in which case the first installment is to be paid on or before March 16, the second on or before June 15, the third on or before September 15, and the fourth on or before December 15, 1942. If the taxpayer elects to pay his tax in four installments, each of the four installments must be equal in amount, but any installment may be paid, at the election of the taxpayer, prior to the time prescribed for its payment. If an installment is not paid in full on or before the date fixed for its payment, the whole amount of the tax remaining unpaid is required to be paid upon

notice and demand from the collector of internal revenue for the district in which the taxpayer's return is required to be filed—that is, to the collector for the district in which is located the taxpayer's legal residence or principal place of business, or if he has no legal residence or principal place of business in the United States, then to the collector of internal revenue at Baltimore, Md.

In the payment of taxes a fractional part of a cent is to be disregarded unless it amounts to one-half cent or more, in which case it shall be increased to one cent. The tax due, if any, should be paid in cash at the collector's office, or by check or money order payable to "Collector of Internal Revenue." In the case of payment in cash, the taxpayer should in every instance require and the collector should furnish a receipt. In the case of payments made by check or money order, however, the canceled check or the money order receipt is usually a sufficient receipt.

Last Call For Income Tax Returns

Have you filed your Federal income tax return? If you come within the group from whom returns are required, you have only until midnight March 16, in which to file a return. Single persons who earned as much as \$14.43 a week for the 52 weeks of 1941; or married persons living together who had aggregate earnings of as much as \$28.85 a week for the year, are required to file returns. The instructions attached to the forms describe the method of preparing returns, but if further information is necessary it may be obtained at the offices of the collector of internal revenue, deputy collector, or an internal revenue agent in charge. They make no charge for their services.

If income-tax returns are placed in the mail, they should be posted in ample time to reach the collector's office on or before the due date—that is, midnight on March 16 for calendar year returns. Taxpayers subject themselves to a penalty for failure to file returns on time.
