## Home Bureau Leaders Exhibit Refinished Furniture

Articles of furniture which have been refinished by Home Bureau leaders will be on exhibit in the Horn room of the Town Hall in Belmont from Friday thru Monday of this week, March 13-16. The exhibit will be open each afternoon with the exception of Sunday from 1 to 5 o'clock. An attendant will be present to answer questions.

Among the pieces to be featured is an oak dining room chair which has been cut down to make the proportions more pleasing and modern. This chair has been bleached and finished in a light pickled effect using white lead rubbed into the pores of the wood.

Several small tables of cherry have been transformed from ugly painted and battered pieces to very usable and lovely articles suitable for any living room.

Since the leaders had to transport these pieces a number of times, the articles are of necessity small, but several different methods of finishing are exemplified. Leaders will start teaching classes in their own communities immediately following this exhibit.

## Blackout of Unattended Lights

Alwin Schaller, Allegheny County Defense Council Chairman, has received an order directing that arrangements be made immediately in connection to all unattended lights in blackout programs.

The order refers specifically to outside advertising signs and window display lights which are left burning during the evening when stores are closed. Such signs and displays should either be extinguished when the stores close or arrangements made to have an attendant always available to extinguish such lights in case of an unexpected alert.

## Urges Greater Fruit Canning

Rationing of sugar should not prevent housewives from preserving more fruit this year than ever before. If sugar is not available, fruit can be canned without it by the "hot-pack" method. After the jars are opened, sugar can be added before serving.

These are statements of Mrs. Katherine B. Head of the Farm Security Administration. She continues:

"Sugar rationing will interfere with jelly making, but if fruit juice is canned by the hot-pack method without sugar, jelly can be made from it later, a few jars at a time, using the normal sugar ration."

"Don't stock ahead on jar rubbers. Hoarding is unpatriotic and old rubber rings, moreover, may lose their resiliency and will not seal the canning jars satisfactorily."

Borrowers of the FSA are going to drink more tomato juice than ever before. Mrs. Head also points out, because low-income farm families who receive loans agree to can at least 30 quarts of tomatoes for each member of the family.

## Hundreds Enroll For Victory Garden Program

All Residents of the County Are Eligible. Next Meeting in April For Planning Program.

Several hundred Home Bureau members and boys and girls throughout the county have enrolled in the Victory Garden Program during the past week as a result made by the Victory Garden Council urging the participation of experienced gardeners in the production of more vegetables and home produced food.

The Allegheny County Victory Garden Council, headed by Eddy Foster of the State School of Agriculture at Alfred, was organized on Thursday evening, March 5th at the Court House in Belmont, naming the Rev. Guy M. Ovenshire vice-chairman, and Lou L. Burton co-ordinator and secretary of the garden program for this area.

Any and all residents of the county are eligible to enroll in the Victory Garden Program and will be forwarded timely information concerning the selection of varieties for Victory Gardens, plans and planting dates of the various vegetables, control of insects and diseases.

The Victory Garden Council will meet again in late April for the purpose of planning a program to encourage the preservation of fruits and vegetables for home use.

The continuation of flower garden, lawn and home garden improvements is urged and is considered an important part of the state, national and local part of the Victory Program. The Garden Clubs are urged to inform their members that this is an important part of the National program.

Organizations participating in the local county programs are the Allegheny County 4-H Club, Farm Bureau, Home Bureau, Dairymen's League, Grange, County Welfare Department, County Nurses Service, Service Clubs, churches and others.

Discussions have been led by County Club Agent Lou L. Burton, on the topics of selection of varieties, fertilization of the family garden, control of insects in more than 30 meetings during the past months. Such meetings will be continued in the future upon the request of local groups.
