The Emergency Crop and Feed Loan Office of the United States Department of Agriculture announces that applications for loans for general crop production purposes, including enlarged garden programs, and for the purchase or production of feed for livestock, including poultry, may be filed now. Loans are made in amounts from \$10 to \$400 at an annual interest rate of four per cent. Those living in the county of Allegany who have not applied and who wish to do so should meet the field supervisor, Carl G. Graybeal, at the Farm Bureau office in Belmont on Tuesday, April 21st, between the hours of 10:30 a. m. to 2 p. m.

Every farmer and dairyman should undertake to produce the maximum quantity of agricultural and dairy products this year that can be produced with his acreage and livestock.

Home Relief Costs Lowest Since 1934

Belmont, April 11.—A further recession in the cost of home relief for Allegany county is reported by Dr. I. G. Howe, county commissioner of public welfare. For March the outlay was \$9,471.06, the smallest expenditure for that month since 1934. The cost in February was \$9,933.24.

The placing of a number of older men in positions hitherto not open to them because of age or physical disabilities has lightened the relief loads.

April 30 Final Date For Ordering Lime

H. L. Hodnett, chairman of the Allegany County Agricultural Conservation Committee, states that April 30 has been set as the final date for ordering lime or superphosphate under the 1942 Conservation program.

The Agricultural Conservation Association working with the county Farm Bureau will hold a series of soil testing clinics during the week April 20-25. At these clinics farmers may bring samples of their soil to be tested for acidity. At the same meeting there will be someone to take orders for conservation lime and superphosphate, for those who have not already placed their orders.
