Elkland Journal Discontinues Publication

The Elkland (Pa.) Journal, Al Button, editor, has joined the increasing number of newspapers which have signed "30" and suspended publication because of the increasing costs and scarcity of trained help and materials and the general decrease in newspaper incomes.

Many of the newspapers that are still hanging on have been forced to raise advertising and subscription rates and drastically cut the number of pages and size of their publication in order to survive.

While the News has so far been able to maintain its usual size, the future holds no guarantee and contemplated changes are in the air now at the News office.

Allegany County Park Commission Announces Camp Dates

The Allegany County Park Commission announces arrangements have been made for camping groups for the 1942 camping season. Sidney Miles, will again direct and supervise the camp for younger boys from June 24 to July 4, at the close of which camping period Mrs. Henrietta Stowe of Olean will conduct and supervise the Camp Fire Girls of this area to July 18. Former Steuben County Judge Dies at Bath

Judge Edwin S. Brown, 71, for many years a highly respected and capable jurist of Steuben county died at the Bath hospital Friday afternoon following several months declining health.

Judge Brown began his law career as an attorney in Cohocton in 1896. He was Steuben county's first election commissioner, a position which he held until his election as district attorney in 1914. He was elevated to the office of county judge in 1921.

Surviving are his widow, two daughters and a son.

Bumper Crop of Maple Products

The New York State Department of Agriculture and Markets released a bulletin on the 1942 maple production this week. The report states that 3,111,000 trees were tapped, 933,000 gallons of maple syrup and 177,000 pounds of maple sugar made. With the exception of 1935 this is the largest yield of maple products in the past ten years. The crop in 1935 is listed at 3,345,000 trees tapped with a production of 987,000 gallons of syrup and 465,000 pounds of maple sugar. New York State was second to Vermont in production among the ten maple producing states.
