New York City.—Altho the Metropolitan New York City area with its crowded apartment houses and even more crowded streets does not seem offhand to be the happiest hunting ground for finding experienced farm hands, more than 1,200 men and women job seekers are registered at the present time at the New York City farm office of the United States Employment Service, all of whom have had considerable farm experience before going to the city.

These workers are available to employers throuth the State and may be secured by local farmers by application to the nearest office of the United States Employment Service. The local USES office will relay the order to New York and will complete the hiring arrangements by telephone.
