**SUNDAY SCHOOL LESSON**  
FRIDAY: THE DAY OF SUFFERING (Gethsemane and Trials)  
International Sunday School Lesson for May 31, 1942.  
Golden Text: "Not my will, but thine, be done."—Luke 22:42.  
Lesson Text: Mark 14:32-34, 44-45; 15:1-5.  
Last week, our lesson recorded the fact that the Passover was celebrated by Jesus with his disciples in an upper room in Jerusalem, probably in the home belonging to Mary, the mother of John Mark. On this occasion the old dispute

about preeminence was renewed. Jesus sought to rebuke it by performing the menial task of washing the feet of the twelve. During the course of the evening he indicated, in response to a question from John, made at Peter's suggestion, that Judas would betray him.

That night Jesus established the new covenant to replace the one made with the Jews when they escaped from Egypt. In this Jesus himself represented the sacrificial lamb. The sacrament of the Lord's Supper was instituted on this occasion, and his disciples were commanded to observe it always as a memorial of him. Upon the completion of this ceremony Jesus led his disciples to the Garden of Gethsemane, where he knew Judas would bring his enemies.

On the way to the Garden Jesus tried to prepare his followers for the events of the night, saying that they would all be offended in him. Peter, with his customary impetuosity, immediately questioned such a prophecy concerning himself. It would have probably been better for him not to have been so confident and boastful. Jesus then told Peter that he would deny him three times. Even the repetition failed to alarm this courageous fisherman, who, in his blind confidence, confidently assured Jesus that death itself would not make him so guilty.

Coming to Gethsemane, Jesus left eight of the disciples at the gate and carried Peter, James and John inside with him. Jesus asked these three friends to sit while he prayed, showing his desire for human companionship in this great crisis of his life. Three times he paused from his agonizing prayer to find his followers sleeping, and therefore he faced the trying ordeal alone. Jesus knew the suffering which lay ahead of him and his prayer was to avoid it, if possible, but as all Christians should pray, he was willing that the Divine Will be carried out.

If Jesus himself felt the need of prayer, what about the modern Christian who only slightly cultivates this spiritual power? The disciples promptly went to sleep leaving Jesus to face the great crisis of his life alone. He prayed that the approaching ordeal might not come, altho he willingly submitted himself to the divine will. If the prayer of Jesus himself could not be answered when life itself was the issue, why should the modern Christian doubt and grumble when lesser petitions remain unanswered in the exercise of a divine judgment?

Finally Judas came, leading the enemies to Jesus. Peter, to his credit, drew his sword to defend his leader, but Jesus rebuked him. For his kingdom was not one of material force. It could not be founded or maintained upon a basis of physical violence. So, Jesus himself admits his identity and accompanies those who sought him. He was carried, first before the ex-high priest, Annas, and then to the ruling priest, Caiaphas, where witnesses testified against him. At length, Jesus affirmed his divinity and the tribunal voted him guilty of blasphemy.

While the examination of Jesus was going on inside the building Peter fulfilled the prophecies concerning himself by three times denying his association with his master. When he realized what he had done he was hurt and wept bitterly.
