 - Second honors (each time) 10 points
 - Perfect attendance for year ----- 50 points
 - 2—Hi Herald
 - Editor or business manager 100 pts.
 - Varsity staff ----- 50 pts.
 - Cub staff ----- 25 pts.
 - 3—Student Officers
 - Officer Student Council ----- 75 pts.
 - Member Student Council ----- 50 pts.
 - Class president ----- 50 pts.
 - Secretary-treasurer of junior or senior class ----- 25 pts.
 - 4—Clubs
 - Approved active membership in any full-year club, (Library Council, Science Club) ----- 25 pts.
 - 5—Dramatics
 - Cast of junior or senior play 50 pts
 - Cast of any other play presented on stage ----- 25 pts.
 - 6—Music
 - Approved full year membership in band, orchestra or chorus (one only) ----- 50 pts.
 - Membership in each additional group ----- 25 pts.
 - 7—Sports
 - Participation in intramural and other sports activities according to rating by physical education instructor ----- 0-200 pts.
 - Cheerleader ----- 50 pts.
- Requirements for the "A" Award:
To win the girls' "A" award, a total of 325 points must be earned in at least four different classifications. Each set of points must be approved by the faculty adviser in accordance with the standards set by the adviser. ACS
