Fifth Registration Date Set For June 30th
Registration in Andover To Be Held at the Office One Day Only Tuesday, June 30th.

Brigadier General Ames T. State Director of Selective Service today that State Headquarters expects a registration in New York State on June 30 of approximately 400,000 young men.

The Governor's proclamation issued last Thursday, confirming the Fifth Registration to one day, June 30. The New York State law requires that the registration take place of the Third Registration at the rate of 500,000 per day.

The Fifth Registration will be held from 10 o'clock a.m. to 6 p.m. on June 30. Those who were born on or before June 1, 1922 and on or before June 1, 1924. On June 30 these registrants reached their 18th, 19th, 20th, 21st, 22nd, 23rd, 24th, 25th, 26th, 27th, 28th, 29th, 30th, 31st, 32nd, 33rd, 34th, 35th, 36th, 37th, 38th, 39th, 40th, 41st, 42nd, 43rd, 44th, 45th, 46th, 47th, 48th, 49th, 50th, 51st, 52nd, 53rd, 54th, 55th, 56th, 57th, 58th, 59th, 60th, 61st, 62nd, 63rd, 64th, 65th, 66th, 67th, 68th, 69th, 70th, 71st, 72nd, 73rd, 74th, 75th, 76th, 77th, 78th, 79th, 80th, 81st, 82nd, 83rd, 84th, 85th, 86th, 87th, 88th, 89th, 90th, 91st, 92nd, 93rd, 94th, 95th, 96th, 97th, 98th, 99th, 100th years old will become registrants.

A major portion of the registrants of the Fifth Registration will be eligible for military service so long as the minimum age is 20; but the remainder will be inducted as soon as they reach their 20th birthday.

Dear Mom and All:
Well you see I am still at MacDill Field. I was sure I'd be shipped out Monday, but I kept a few here and I am glad when I find there they had been sent to another field near by to sleep in tents. They are so many in the army now that they are not getting much to do, being in a company, that is about as good as being in a base. I am lucky to be attached to a better position than I should ever use. I am in the air force I will be sent across soon. But you never know long it will be. They will not ship any more about six weeks but you like it here quite well. I am homesick, although it seems I left home.

It has started to rain here. I claim June is a rainy month. I guess it is right. They are going to give me so I guess I stand a good chance of going to I am quite sure it will be. They give travel money that helps when you are on long distances. I saw a plane that 31 trains run between here and New York. A fellow got a letter from the boys who was left behind who said they had been about 100 miles from home. McAndrew was among the boys.
