You are always writing about girls who can't stay away from their parents but keep leaving their husbands—and running back to Mamma because they get home sick. Well, suppose you tell us something about the mothers who can't let their daughters alone.

My mother and I were very companionable before I was married and she hated it very much when my husband and I moved to another town to live. But it didn't stop there, for scarcely a week passes that mother doesn't come down to spend several days. She leaves father home, as he has to stick to his job, and my two sisters who are old enough to be having dates, while she visits with me.

Now my husband is getting to the point where he is not as glad to see mother as he used to be. We are invited to young people's parties but if mother happens to be on one of her visits, we have to stay at home with her. I don't know exactly what to do. As far as I am concerned, I love mother and would enjoy her coming if it were not for the fact that I know how father and my husband both feel about it.

You are evidently your mother's favorite child and she enjoys being with you so much that she forgets how selfishly she is acting.

In the first place, if she has two young daughters and a husband her place is at home where she can look after the management and comfort of her home and family. If she can arrange to run down to see you for a day that will be very nice or if she pays you a visit every now and then it will be all right. But for your mother to spend half of her time with you is ridiculous.
