**License Not Necessary for Farm Tractors**

A statement from the Department of Taxation and regarding the question of requiring a license if driving highways is as follows:

Tractors used to haul other vehicle to transport milk or other agricultural products on the highways for the use of the owner and in manner used for hire are exempt from purchasing a license under present laws.

The above answers tractor question which has been the subject of a check made on unlicensed tractor highways.

**Ration Ticket No. 4 Until June 30**

Ticket No. 4 in your ration book for one pound of oil June 30th, according to announcement by the Buffalo office of OPA.

To what use Ticket No. 4 is not known yet. It may be for sugar, tea, coffee or commodity the OPA may decide to place on it.
