## Health Camp To Open July 5th

The Children's Health Camp at Cuba Lake will open its 22nd year on July 5th and close August 29th. It is planned to have three groups of children for three weeks each.

Miss Catherine M. Codispoti, Belmont, executive secretary of the Allegany Health and Tuberculosis Assn., will be camp director, assisting her will be a play director, eight counselors, cook, nurse and doctor.

The camp is conducted by the Allegany Health and Tuberculosis Association, and is open without charge to any child between the ages of 5 and 12, who for any reason needs a special course of training or physical building up.

The camp cared for 262 children last year, it is hoped that an equal number can be cared for this year. Applications for admission should be made to the association's office in Belmont. A medical examination is requested before admission and no child suffering from a communicable disease will be accepted.

Services were held at the home in Wellsville Sunday afternoon, the Rev. Guy M. Ovenshire officiating. The body was taken to Bayonne, N. J. Sunday night where services were held Monday afternoon with interment in Moravian cemetery at New Dorp, Staten Island.

## School State Aid Money Distributed By County Treas.

A total of \$435,533.82 in state aid to common, high and central schools in Allegany county has been received by County Treasurer Frank L. Gare from Albany and disbursed to supervisors for common schools and to school treasurers for other schools. This is the second installment and final one from the state for 1942. The amounts received by districts are exclusive of reductions for the teacher retirement fund which is annually subtracted from the remittances of the second one-half of state aid received.

Retirement funds in this county, deducted from remittances, amounted to \$59,007.73, exclusive of those for Wellsville schools which received a net amount of \$41,364.46.

In District 5, W. G. Pope, Andover, superintendent, the distributions were: To common schools in the town of Andover, \$192.58; Independence, \$2,038; Wellsville, \$2,938.16; Willing, \$3,389.53; to Andover Central School, \$28,004.37; Whitesville High School, \$6,234.01.
