## Exchange Club to Sponsor Blood Bank Here

## Civilian Protection Conferences To Be Held

Albany, N. Y.—Questions on local war problems will be answered for chairmen of city and county War Councils and directors of Civilian Protection and Civilian Mobilization at a series of regional conferences to be held thruout the state this month.

Lieutenant Governor Charles Poletti, Coordinator of State War Plans, who will be present at the meetings, states that the conferences have been called for the purpose of clarifying the functions of state and local offices connected with the war effort. The New York State War Emergency Act will be explained in detail, and the program and plans of the State War Council and its agencies will be outlined.

The conference which Allegany county chairmen will attend is to be held in Buffalo on Tuesday, July 14th.

## State Closes Fiscal Year With a Substantial Balance

Governor Lehman today issued the following statement: "I am very happy indeed to be able to report that the financial position of the State at the close of the fiscal year is unusually strong."

New York State has closed its fiscal year ending June 30, 1942, with an operating surplus of \$47,098,163 and with an accumulated surplus of \$54,127,419. This large surplus was realized despite the repeal of the one per cent emergency tax and a reduction by 25 per cent in the personal income levy, which saved citizens of the State more than \$45,000,000 in the past year, and in many cases cut their income tax payments in half.

The gratifying financial position of the State is due both to increased revenues and to very substantial savings and economies in state operating costs.

Receipts during the year ending June 30, 1942, aggregated \$421,265,940, or \$30,173,937 above my deliberately conservative budget estimates. Expenditures, because of economies and savings, totalled only \$374,167,777, or \$8,478,113 below the budget estimates. These factors have created a surplus for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1942 of \$47,098,163. To this is to be added the surplus of \$7,029,256 carried forward from June 30, 1941, making an accumulated surplus of \$54,127,419 on June 30, 1942—the largest since 1931.

While the financial position of the State is obviously excellent, I wish to urge again that the State continue to economize and save in every way possible in the future. There are many problems and uncertainties on the horizon. Gasoline and tire rationing are reducing sharply collections from motor fuel and motor vehicle taxes. Further problems arising out of our war effort may also affect adversely other sources of revenue and may require the expenditure of large additional sums of money. Under the circumstances, altho at the present time we have a surplus of large proportions in hand, we must continue carefully to husband all of our resources so that the present unsurpassed credit of the State may be maintained and at the same time the people may continue to benefit from and enjoy the many services which the State has furnished them for the past ten years.

## Children's Health Camp Opens

The Children's Health Camp at Cuba Lake, conducted annually for 22 years by the Allegany Health & Tuberculosis Association, is to open July 5 for a two-week period with about 85 children enrolled. On July 19th this group will be replaced by 85 more children who will remain for three weeks and on August 9th the third group of the same number of children will enter for a three-week period.

These children will be given a good time of organized play, swimming, craft work, careful medical attention, upbuilding, healthful diet, etc.

The first group of children come from nine communities of the county: Andover, Belfast, Belmont, Bolivar, Cuba, Friendship, New Hudson, Scio and Wellsville. This group was selected from a list of 400 names as the most likely to be benefited by a stay under the expert guidance in the healthful location of the camp following physical examination and a careful personal check-up. Children from other towns will be taken care of in the later camps.

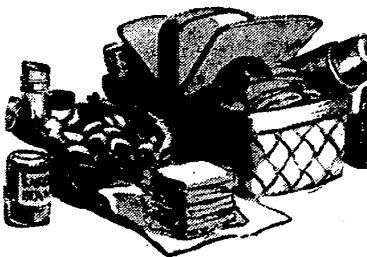

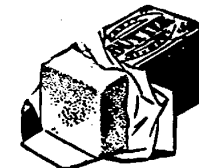
