Transportation Head to Form Car-Sharing Club

H. G. Young of Fillmore, who has been appointed War Transportation Administrator for Allegany County, this week called for prompt and active local participation in the state-wide program for the conservation of transportation facilities, with emphasis upon immediate formation of Car Sharing Clubs.

Announcing the initiation of plans for an organization to undertake the work in this area, Mr. Young declared there was no longer any doubt as to the urgency of the problem of "keeping the wheels of vital transportation equipment rolling for the duration."

"All of us, if we have not already done so, must now recognize that 'travel as usual' is out," he said. "We must accept the fact that motor vehicle equipment, tires in particular, cannot now be replaced and that there is no prospect of replacements for many, many months to come."

"It is necessary, therefore, that we get the longest possible life, the most efficient possible service from all privately, as well as publicly owned vehicles. That is the purpose of the conservation program we hope to carry out here."

Mr. Young indicated that whereas the conservation program is being initiated by the State War Transportation Committee and conducted under its general direction, the various projects and activities will be developed and carried on locally.

"It means," he said, "that we will need the support, co-operation and active assistance and participation of city and county officials, business and industry, organizations and civic groups, workers, shoppers, motorists."

The local administrator made it clear that "we're not taking away or hindering transportation—that's already been done by the enemy. We are trying to keep it going; to get the full benefit of existing facilities in the hope that we can make them last for the duration of the war."

"To accomplish this objective may call for some readjustments in our habits and may result in some inconveniences," he added. "It will probably be necessary to stagger working hours of business and industry. It will certainly be necessary to arrange for pooling of rides by workers, thereby eliminating duplication of vehicle use."

"The immediate objective is forming of Car Sharing Clubs to obtain a maximum of use from a minimum of vehicles. Membership in a car-sharing group is essential not only as a part of our conservation campaign, but it is also necessary for securing needed gasoline in excess of the basic minimum ration after July 22."

"Don't drive alone! Double up now and save gas and rubber for the duration!"
