FRUIT, FLOWERS AND GARDEN

NO NEED TO SAVE SEED

American seed growers are independent of seed imports from Europe. They produce at home almost every kind of garden seed that formerly was imported in large quantities. Officials of the trade say that there will be enough vegetable seeds for every commercial grower and home gardener in 1943.

Seed production is highly specialized. Many good seed houses employ a staff well trained in plant breeding, plant diseases, and other sciences. They keep a watchful eye on thousands of acres where seed is produced. Special equipment is used for harvesting, cleaning and curing, and for the chemical treatment of the seed to assure stock of

high germination and free from disease.

Seed gathered from your own garden may result in crop failures next year. Here are some of the difficulties which arise from using home-grown seed:

Some seeds are likely to carry several kinds of disease organisms, beans particularly. Seed potatoes from the garden patch are rarely free from virus diseases that are carried inside the potato and cannot be seen. Seeds from summer squash and pumpkins are likely to cross with each other. Those from hybrid stock, such as sweet corn, give a poor quality and no uniformity. Home grown seed may also lose its viability because it can not be cured properly or because of poor storage conditions.

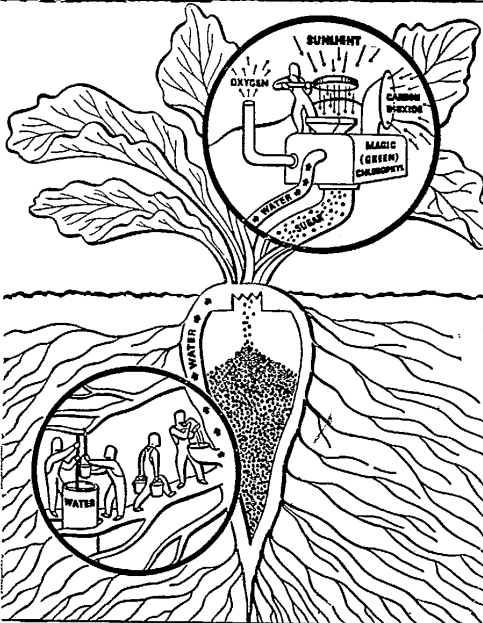

Nature's Sugar Factory at Work



Sugar of some kind is found in the sap of every living plant. Nature stores more sugar in the sugar beet and the sugar cane than in other plants, and for that reason they have become the chief sources of the world's sugar supply. Sugar is formed in plants through a process of photosynthesis, which is illustrated in the case of the sugar beet in the accompanying photograph. In this process, carbon dioxide from the air and water from the soil are combined within the plant through the agency of green pigment known as chlorophyll in the presence of light. For that reason sugar is often called "crystallized sunshine and water." The sugar which is manufactured within the green parts of the sugar beet is used principally for growth during the early part of the beet's life but later in the season most of the sugar is carried to the root where it is stored.

To the scientist sugar is "sucrose," and in its pure form even chemists cannot tell whether it came from the sugar beet or the sugar cane. Sugar from beets is identical with sugar from cane in appearance, sweetness, quality, and food value, and they may be used interchangeably for all purposes. In 1942, according to estimates of the Office of Price Administration, which directs the sugar rationing program, beet sugar will be the most important single source of our national sugar supply. Within a few weeks farmers of nineteen states will begin the harvest of more than one million acres of sugar beets. The crop is expected to produce approximately two million tons of sugar, enough to give a weekly ration of eight ounces for one year to every person in the United States. It is expected to be the largest crop in history.

HOW, WHAT AND WHY?

Blueberry Maggot
Mrs. F. A. J. writes: "It has been stated that blueberries contain a species of maggots or worms. Is this true?"

Prof. J. A. Evans of the College of Agriculture replies:

"There is a blueberry maggot which is a problem in some areas outside New York State. At the present time, the commercial blueberry crop in New York is not extensive and I have not yet run into any infestation of this pest. I have talked with a number of blueberry growers in various parts of the state and none of them has as yet complained about injury from this insect. We have no information on its control in this state but if you are interested in this subject you might write to the Department of Entomology, University of Maine, Orono, Maine.

Heading Chinese Cabbage
S. W. N. asks: "Should Chinese cabbage be tied up to make it head?"

Prof. R. D. Sweet answers: "It is not necessary to tie up the leaves of the Chinese cabbage in order to make a head because this vegetable heads naturally just as cabbage and head lettuce.

"The general cultural requirements of Chinese cabbage are similar to those of our ordinary cabbages. You will, therefore, probably be troubled with cabbage worms and other insects ordinarily attacking cabbage. For information on the control of such insects, contact your county agricultural agent.
