### Make Your Soldier Christmas Packages Light and Small

Exact specification for size of packages for delivery outside the continental United States have been announced by the Postmaster General, the Red Cross is informed.

To expedite the movement of vital war supplies, no package can be accepted for mailing if it exceeds eleven pounds in weight, 18 inches in length, or 42 inches in length and girth combined. Not more than one package may be mailed in any one week by the same person to the same addressee.

This order does not apply to matter addressed to Canada or Mexico.

It includes all mail for Alaska, the Canal Zone, Hawaii, Puerto Rico and the island possessions of the United States; mail addressed to army postoffices in care of the postmaster at New York, San Francisco or Seattle, and mail for naval forces addressed in care of the postmaster at New York or San Francisco.

No exceptions will be made unless the mailor present a permit, postoffice, war or navy department, issued under the regulations of the Postmaster General.

### State Money Received By County Treasurer

Allegheny County Treasurer Frank L. Gere has received from the State and distributed to towns and villages in the county nearly \$48,000 as this county's share of the New York State income and franchise taxes.

The county received \$31,417.38 as its share of the New York State income tax of which Andover township was allotted \$716.42 and Andover village \$323.38.

Franchise tax money returned to the county from the State was \$16,554.48, of which Andover township received \$10.41 and the village \$4.40.

### Alfred to Have Special War Courses

When Alfred University begins registration on September 8 for the school year of 1942-43, men of the student body will have access to any one of five special programs set up by the armed services.

The Army Air Corps, the Army Enlisted Reserve Corp, and the Marine Corp programs for college students will be open to members of any of the four college classes. The Navy V-1 program will be open to entering freshmen, and the Navy V-7 program will be available for juniors and seniors.

### Fluid Milk Sales in New York Reach Record in July

Farmers To Get Uniform Price of \$2.54 Per Hundredweight, Says Milk Administrator.

With consumption of fluid milk in July at a record high level, the uniform price dairy farmers of the six states of the New York milk-shed will collect for July deliveries is \$2.54 a hundredweight, which betters the July 1941 price by 24 cents for a rise of 10.4 per cent, and is the peak blended rate for the month since 1920.

In announcing the computed price N. J. Cladakis, administrator of the New York metropolitan milk marketing area, reported the July milk pool will yield a farm value of \$15,138,706.67 for a gain of 25 per cent over the previous July's return.

"Improvement in the utilization of milk as well as the higher price levels it is selling at is responsible for the uniform price of \$2.54," Mr. Cladakis commented. "The rate has turned out four cents better than our forecast of \$2.50 mainly because more milk was sold in the more valuable uses.

"Slicing the deductions from the pool to pay diversion claims nearly 55 per cent as a result of the restriction of such payments last April also has improved the farm return. Diversion costs the July 1941 pool \$270,952.16. This July they came to only \$123,968.95. The difference can be marked up as a gain of nearly three cents a hundredweight to this pool.

"A large part of the increased value can be credited to the higher price of fluid milk, \$3.10 as compared with \$2.65 a hundredweight, and to a gain of 5.2 per cent in fluid consumption. July was the sixth straight month with fluid sales above the previous month.

"Fluid milk in July reached 220,027,488 pounds in the New York area and is the largest volume on record for any month since the federal-state marketing orders became effective Sept. 1, 1938. Only once before has the fluid volume approached that peak and that was in October 1938 when the sales hit 220,473,310. The average consumption of fluid milk was 208,229,831 pounds a month in 1940, and 206,084,407 in 1941.
