Northern Allegany May Lose Gas Service

The Cabot Gas Corporation has made application to abandon the 75 mile, 14-inch pipe line which that company recently laid from the Pennsylvania gas fields to Rochester, and from which the towns of Fillmore, Hume and Rosburg get their gas supply.

Depleted gas reserves in the Pennsylvania field is given by the company for the proposed action. The pipe line was originally laid to supply large Rochester interests with gas, but since all of the Rochester companies have returned to coal and the Cabot company maintains the position that the 75 miles of pipe could be used to more advantage elsewhere.

The Godfrey L. Cabot Co. has also asked permission to cease supplying natural gas at points in Angelica and Belmont and to the Empire Gas & Fuel Co. in Allegany county.

22nd Cuba Lake Health Camp Season Closes

The last of the 215 children cared for at the Allegany County Children's Health Camp at Cuba Lake during the past eight weeks returned to their homes last Thursday, August 27. Their departure brought to a close the 22nd annual season at the camp owned and operated by the Allegany Health and Tuberculosis Association.

Throughout the months of July and August undernourished and underprivileged children from 24 towns in Allegany county were given an opportunity to improve their health habits, physical condition and social outlook. Campers this summer showed remarkable increases in weight and improvement in physical condition.

A program incorporating regular rest, balanced meals, training in personal and health habits, creative recreation and personality development has been supervised by Miss Catherine M. Codispoti, camp director, and a staff of 15 members. Each child is encouraged to develop innate abilities, assume responsibility and improve his standard of personal living.

"Thru the efforts of the camp committee and interested Allegany county citizens, every one of the children who attended the camp this summer has left better prepared, both mentally and physically to live in an America at war," stated Miss Codispoti.
