Northern Allegany May Lose Gas Service

The Cabot Gas Corporation has made application to abandon the 75 mile, 14-inch pipe line which that company recently laid from the Pennsylvania gas fields to Rochester, and from which the towns of Fill-more, Hume and Rossburg get their gas supply.

Depleted gas reserves in the Pennsylvania field is given by the com-pany for the proposed action. The pipe line was originally laid to sup-ply large Rochester interests with gas, but since all of the Rochester companies have returned to coal and the Cabot company maintains the position that the 75 miles of pipe could be used to more advantage

Godfrey L. Cabot Co. also asked permission to cease sup-plying natural gas at points in An-gelica and Belmont and to the Em-pire Gas & Fuel Co. in Allegany county.
