Motorists Urged To Protect 1942 Auto Plates

With current license plates slated for use next year, motorists are urged by State Commissioner of Motor Vehicles John Splain to keep their plates in good condition.

Commissioner Splain advocated the application of one or two coats of clear spar varnish as the best method of protection.

"I would suggest that motorists apply the varnish to both sides of their present plate as well as to the cover strip when that is issued," he said. "This will serve to protect the plate against weather conditions."

In pointing out the necessity of keeping license plates in good condition for identification purposes, Commissioner Splain said no duplicate plates can be issued and that persons whose plates are lost or stolen must present an affidavit before the Bureau of Motor Vehicles will issue new plates.

According to the Division of State Police, at least 95 per cent of the 1942 license plates displayed at the present time are in excellent condition.

Girls Needed For Milk Testing

The New York Dairy Herd Improvement Association is experiencing a shortage of milk testers, and a two weeks' training school is now planned for every month in each county to train testers.

The course will include Babcock testing, D. H. I. A. records and their application, health, feeding and breeding. Before being approved for association work at the end of the school, applicants must pass an examination for license in Babcock testing given by State inspectors. While the regulations require that applicants for a Babcock testing license be at least 18 years of age, the State Department has waived this rule and may now issue a license to persons under 18 years who are otherwise qualified, and who are able to pass the examination, according to Mr. Taibly.

The next school will be conducted Sept. 14 to 26. Cost of the course will be a laboratory fee of \$2.00 plus room and board which can be had for \$8 to \$12 per week.

New Game Syllabus Ready For Distribution

Publication of a new and improved edition of the syllabus of fish and game laws is announced by Conservation Commissioner Lithgow Osborne. Designed primarily to keep New York State sportsmen posted on open seasons and bag limits of fish and game species, the new booklet this year, also contains a wealth of information of vital importance to sportsmen.

Commissioner Osborne in announcing the publication of the new syllabus said that distribution would be made in the usual manner and that sportsmen would receive their copy when purchasing licenses.

In this year's syllabus, an effort has been made to answer many questions uppermost in the minds of sportsmen. For instance, drawings on the cover depict the male and female pheasant, ruffed grouse or partridge, woodcock and quail. Shown in flight, the reproductions will help sportsmen to know his birds.

James P. Greene

James P. Greene, son of James S. and Sarah A. (Phillips) Greene, was born in Andover, June 30, 1878 and died suddenly at his late home 6909 Fifth St., Washington, D. C., after some years suffering from heart disease, August 26, 1942.

He attended Alfred Academy and Alfred University, a business school in Buffalo, Benjamin Franklin School of Accountancy in Washington, and Columbia University special courses in Accountancy. He was employed at the Brooklyn Navy yard before going to the position of accountant in the Treasury Department in Washington about 28 years ago, where he has held a responsible position and rendered faithful service until his sudden death.

He married for his first wife, Miss Minnie Hall of Andover, and after her death he married Miss Carrie Adams of Washington, D. C., December 24, 1918, who survives. A sister and several nieces and nephews in Michigan and Washington, D. C., and in New York state, remain to mourn his death.
