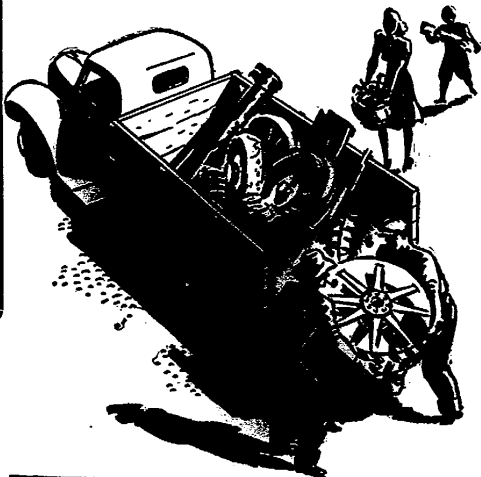

It Is Badly Needed

The most serious problem confronting our war effort today is shortage of scrap iron and steel. There is sufficient scrap scrap around the country, the job is to locate and collect it.

The War Production Administration is calling for 17 million tons of scrap iron and steel before the end of the year. It is the only way to interrupt production and conserve our industrial resources.

Quotas worked out call for 100,000 tons of scrap iron from the rural community, 100,000 tons from every farm, and 100,000 tons from every scrap yard.

Andover has sent its representatives to the service. Andover is buying War Bonds to fund their training and now to us to provide them with necessary equipment to carry out their training.

That equipment has come from the scrap of every farm or business establishment in America. So get it out and into the hands of the men who are trained to use it to prepare it for shipment to where the need for it is greatest.

Junk Rally Day in Andover is this Saturday, by that name. It is the local Salvage Committee which consists of C. M. W. Jackson, R. E. Spicer, Howard Burdick and Ralph Burgett.

You have a quantity of scrap metal and a junk dealer will buy it for you. He will pay for it when taking it away. Only a small amount which they wish to donate can be left at home. He will call the garage and it will be collected.

The local firemen will operate in the scrap rally. They are residents in moving objects from attics, garages, backyards and will assist the Salvage Committee in collecting it. Scrap tin and waste not be collected in this way. They are for later collection.

**Fifth Supervisory District Abolished Effective Oct.**

The New York State Board of Education this week announced the consolidation of all the state's five supervisory districts into four following the vacation of the office of W. G. Andover, Fifth Supervisory Superintendent for many years.

Towns served in the supervisory area have been assigned to the Third and Fourth Districts as follows:

Independence, Willingboro, and Whitesville school districts are in the Third Supervisory District. Also included are Alamo, Bolivar, Genesee, Scio and W. J. Coyle of Richburg.

Alfred, Andover and Coudersport were added to the supervisory district which includes Almond, Angell, Burns, Grove and West. William H. Garwood of Alfred is superintendent.

The order becomes effective Oct. 1st.
