SELECTIVE SERVICE In New York State

"To be considered for occupational deferment, an employee must have employment with an essential industry, business, or profession," Brigadier General Ames T. Brown, New York State Director of Selective Service, declared today, "but the necessity of the business is not the sole factor in determining whether the employee can be replaced."

All male American citizens and resident aliens between 20 and 45 are eligible for military service. The purpose of a deferment is to give the employer an opportunity to secure a replacement for the prospective soldier. The deferment is not indefinite nor permanent in time.

"We wish to assist the essential business or industry to operate with a maximum of efficiency," General Brown said. "If a deferment will prevent serious disruption of operation, it should be given. The employer must, however, look for replacements for his 20-45 employees for eventually all except those who cannot be replaced will be in the armed forces if they are physically able. That is the law."

their review of the classification of single men with dependents. This directive does not include married men who do not maintain homes with their wives, or registrants who have married since December 7, 1941 or when selection was imminent, as men in these categories were already subject to induction. In reviewing the classification, the Local Board must take into consideration whether the registrant's occupation entitled him to be placed in Class 11.

Undue Hardship
General Brown emphasized that while Local Boards are required to consider the amount dependents will receive after induction of the registrant, when reviewing a Class 11 classification, the problem is

not the difference in income of the wife through the induction of her husband but whether her income would be so reduced as to cause undue hardship. As all citizens are expected to make a sacrifice, the Local Board must determine whether a reasonable person would consider the situation to be undue hardship.

Navy Enlistments
The Navy hereafter will not enlist any registrant between the ages of 20 and 45 who is classified in Classes 11-A, 11-B, or 111-B, without a statement of the registrant's employer and a release by his Local Board. General Brown stated the new procedure does not apply to the enlisting of officer candidates and aviation cadets.
