### Progressives, Co-operatives Plan Campaigns

Plans for electing three student council members at large, to be chosen from the Progressive and Co-operative parties were well under way this week.

The delegates from each of the parties met Wednesday morning to select five delegates from the incoming Freshman class and to fill the vacancies left by those people who have left school or have been promoted to another class.

Each group of delegates then chose nominees for the three members at large and selected a party manager.

At the time the Hi Herald went to press, the meeting had not been held, but the names of the people on each party will appear in the paper next week.

This is the fourth year that this unusual method of electing the three Student Council members at large has been in use. For the benefit of those who are not familiar with it, the entire procedure (in simple form) is as follows:

Five representatives to each party are chosen from each of the four classes. This makes 20 members for both the Progressive and Co-operative, 40 members in all. These parties then meet and each one nominates three representatives at large for the Student Council (six people in all). Each party adopts a platform and planks for the campaign which it will carry on in an effort to have the three candidates elected.

This year the campaign will begin immediately following the potato harvesting vacation. They will terminate in an election to be held about the third week in October. Voting by the student body will take place on the voting machine in the village hall, as has been done in previous years. Those three people who receive the three highest number of votes, regardless of party, will sit on the 1942-43 Student Council.

Miss Pauline Anderson is faculty adviser for the Progressive Party and "Coach" Bob Ingerson will help the Co-operatives form their party platform.

The remaining four members of the Student Council (a body of seven students and Mr. William Maloy, as faculty adviser) are chosen from the high school classes, one from each class selected by popular vote of the class to be its representative.

### Hi Herald Staff Meets

Staff members of the Hi Herald were given a pep talk by Miss Colberg, last Tuesday afternoon at a meeting which was held in the science room during the eighth period. Miss Colberg stressed the fact that no matter how good the article is, if it isn't in on time it will not be accepted. The cub and varsity staff will be announced at the end of the three weeks' trial period which will be October 15. Previous to this each paper is being considered on who is most able to write for the paper. New pupils trying out this year are Billy Dougherty, Barbara Childs, Louis Wintenberg, Donald Northrup, Ruth Hardy, and Basil Dunham. ### Agricultural Fair Huge Success

Annual Activity Sponsored By Local Exchange Club Draws Large Crowd.

The annual agricultural school fair, put on by the Future Farmers of America of Andover Central School, and the Andover 4 H Club, under the leadership of Mr. Carl Fribolin and sponsored by the Andover Exchange Club, was held Thursday evening, September 24. An excellent display of garden produce and poultry filled the gymnasium and in a tent back of the school was a fine display of livestock as might be seen at any county fair. Twenty-nine head of calves and yearlings were shown.

Judging the various exhibits was done by Lou L. Burton, County 4 H Club Agent with assistance by Clifford Harrington, County Farm Bureau Agent.

A crowd of approximately 350 people visited the exhibit. The garden produce was sold at public auction during the evening with John Lever as guest auctioneer. Moving pictures relating to floods and soil conservation were shown at the close of the exhibit.

The date of the next meeting is to be announced and will be held in Friendship. CH

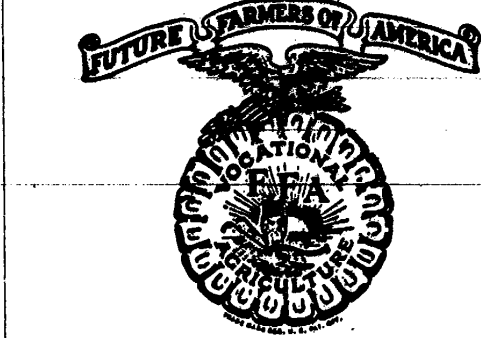
### Senior Candy Sale Is Success

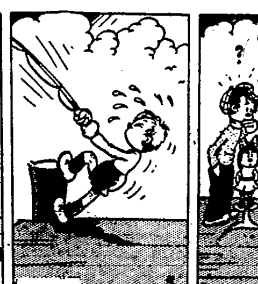
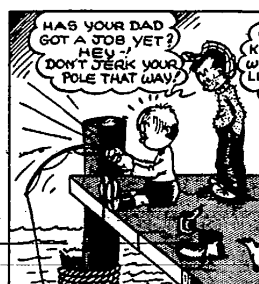
