Hunting Hours Clarified By Conservation Dept.

All Time Given in Laws Standard Time, Which Will Be Observed This Season.

Albany, Oct. 1.—It would appear from the numerous inquiries being received by the Conservation Department that some sportsmen are experiencing difficulty in determining what are the hours during which wildlife may be taken when such hours are fixed in the law.

To clarify the situation, Acting Conservation Commissioner John T. Gibbs has issued the following statement:

"The nation is operating on War Time and will continue so to operate until there is a change by Federal proclamation.

"In all cases where the shooting hour starts on the opening day of a given open season in the middle of the day, the hunting hours will be from 1 p. m. to 6 p. m., War Time.

"In all cases where the remaining days of the open season start in the morning and stop in the evening, the hours will be from 8 a. m. to 6 p. m., War Time.

"In all cases where wildlife may be taken from sunrise to sunset on each day of the open season, sportsmen should be governed by the time of sunrise and sunset fixed by any standard almanac or government timetable for the area or county hunted. On each day of the open season on grouse or partridge and migratory birds hunting will start at sunrise and end at sunset. To illustrate how the sportsmen should figure out the starting and closing hours, take the case of grouse or partridge in the Albany area. The season opens October 1. On that date, according to the World Almanac for 1942, sunrise occurs at 5:51 a. m., Eastern Standard Time.

Therefore, the sportsmen may start to take the species listed above at 6:51 a. m., War Time. Sunset on that date in the Albany area will occur at 5:38 p. m., Eastern Standard Time. Therefore, the sportsmen must stop hunting at 6:38 p. m., War Time. In other words, throughout the State sportsmen may start to take the above species of wildlife by their watches, one hour later than the time of sunrise stated in any reliable almanac.

"Fur bearing animals may be taken during any hour of the day or night on any day of the open season fixed therefor.

"Quadrupeds and birds not protected by law may be taken at any hour of the day or night at any time.

"Deer and bear may be taken on any day of the open season from 8 a. m., War Time to 6 p. m., War Time."
