September Uniform Milk Price Set At \$2.90

The metropolitan pool of New York-area approved milk delivered in September in the six states of the New York milkshed produced new records when the rate of \$2.90 a hundredweight was figured as the uniform price dairy farmers will collect later this month.

Announcing the September price, Charles J. Blanford, administrator of the New York metropolitan milk marketing area, reported today that the pool will yield a farm value of \$14,640,022.08.

"The pool return, however, will be shared among the smallest number of producers ever to deliver in any month since the federal-state marketing orders took effect in September, 1938," Dr. Blanford pointed out. "The pool was formed by deliveries of 56,522 dairy farmers."

"Another record was set when the price reached \$2.90. It is the highest price so far computed under the terms of the orders. It exceeds by eight cents the previous peak of \$2.82 that applied to milk delivered in November 1941. The current year, moreover, is 14.2 per cent above the price of \$2.54 that was computed for September 1941."

"Despite the decline in producers, the pool contained 2.3 per cent more milk than it did in September a year ago. The volume this September weighed 477,455,790 pounds. Last year the pool, delivered by 58,752 dairy farmers, held 466,931,894 pounds."
