The question has arisen as to what might be the best way to use the \$20 raised by last year's Student Council.

Among the many suggestions, we find the good one: "Why not save it?" This is what we should do for soon we'll have a new Student Council and it will be convenient for them if they have some money on which to depend when they begin the year. Twenty dollars would give them something to work with until they are "on their feet." Then, at the end of the year, this \$20, plus what the council earns this year, could be pooled and a bigger sum would be available with which to act more advantageously in the future.

Buying a bond with the money would be another way to accomplish nearly the same purpose, i. e.: that of saving it, tho this would keep the money tied up for such a number of years that the people now in high school would not benefit from it in any way other than knowing that they have helped their country in time of need.

Another suggestion was that of securing a flag or some type of bulletin board on which to put stars bearing the names of those Andover students and alumni who are now in the service.

Someone suggested that a picture for either the office or the library would be suitable. True, it would make either place more attractive, but because it is not at all necessary, most of the students with whom we have talked vetoed the idea.

If there is any further question about this problem, its solution should be left up to the students. After all, it's their money—earned for them under the leadership of the Student Council which they elected to act in their behalf—and it's they, themselves, as a majority, that they have to please. They should get what they want and something that would benefit the students and their school. VLM
