## Trapping Season Coon, Skunk and Mink Open

The trapping season for raccoon, skunk and mink opened today, Thursday, Nov. 5. The open season for raccoons runs until January 20; skunk thru February 10 and mink until March 15.

Furbearing animals, with certain exceptions, may be taken in any manner, day or night, during the open season. Raccoon may not be taken from dens or houses or by cutting den trees. Skunks cannot be taken from holes, or dens by digging or with the aid of dogs. The use of smoke, chemicals, gas or poison is prohibited in taking all furbearing animals.

Traps of the leg-gripping type having teeth in the jaws or having a greater spread of jaws than six inches cannot be used to take furbearing animals. Traps must bear the name of the operator and must be visited at least once every 24 hours.

Conservation Department officials also pointed out that there is no open season for otter, fisher, sable or marten in New York State. Open seasons on beaver are set by Conservation Department order and when deemed advisable occur during the month of March. The muskrat season in New York State opens the first day of January.
