SUNDAY SCHOOL LESSON

THE MISSION OF THE CHURCH

International Sunday School Lesson for Nov. 29, 1942.

Golden Text: "As the Father hath sent me, even so send I you."—John 20:21.

Lesson Text: Matt. 18:15-7; Acts 1:8; 2:42; 6:1-4; 11:27-39; 13:1-3; 1 John 1:3.

Usually, in a consideration of the church, we think of the subject from the standpoint of the individual's

contribution to the church. In this lesson, we will approach the subject from another angle—that of the church's contribution to the individual.

Just what is the mission of the church? We believe that a proper answer to that question is that "the church is an institution composed of believers, banded together to do the will of God."

The church's primary business is to win the unsaved to Christ, thus promoting Christ's comprehensive program. Just before Jesus left his disciples, he gave them, and thru them, to us, what we have come to call "The Great Commission." This is to be found in Matt. 28:18-20. You are probably familiar with this great command of Jesus, but for the practical purpose of this lesson, we will review somewhat.

Where are Christ's disciples to go? They were to go everywhere—to all nations. Who was to go? Everyone who heard and accepted the Gospel had the responsibility to be a witness for Christ. What were they to do? (1) They were to make disciples; (2) baptize those won, and (3) teach the new believers to observe and to obey all the commands of Jesus. Why should they go? (1) As Jesus was soon to go away, they were to carry on his work in the world; (2) he had all power; and (3) he would go with them.

Another function of the church is revealed by study of I John 1:3 and Matthew 18:15-17, that is to provide an atmosphere of fellowship which is conducive to spiritual growth. One of the greatest advantages to the individual church member lies in association with other Christian characters. It is the duty of the church to provide for its members an atmosphere in which they can grow more like Christ.

In this connection, one writer declares: "The church may well be compared to a flower garden. The flowers are planted together in an orderly arrangement and often the garden plot is protected by a fence or a walk. Of course, plants may grow on the outside of the plot, but they receive less cultivation and are exposed to greater dangers. One may not be aware of the protection thus found in an active church membership, but it is none the less real."

When we speak of fellowship, it might be interesting to learn its root meaning. Its simple definition is companionship, which comes from two Latin words: con, together, and panis, bread. So that literally a companion is one with whom we eat bread. Thus, it is fitting that we apply this word to our church association, those with whom we eat the bread of the Lord's table.

The church also offers a place for the public worship of God. Thru worship, the individual is brought to a keener sense of the Lord's presence in his life, which will result in a better understanding of God's will for one's life, which, in turn, will inspire the individual worshiper to a life of helpful service.

The church also inspires individuals to mutual sharing. This not only involves the sharing of money, thru financial contributions to the program of the church, but also fosters the spirit of generosity and thoughtfulness for the needs of less fortunate members of the church, the community and the world. The members of the early church set a worthy example for all Christians to follow in their sacrificial sharing of worldly possessions. While it may not be practical in this day to practice communal giving, surely the message of the church, properly given and received, will lead its members to proportionate and purposeful giving of money and talents to the work of spreading the Gospel.
