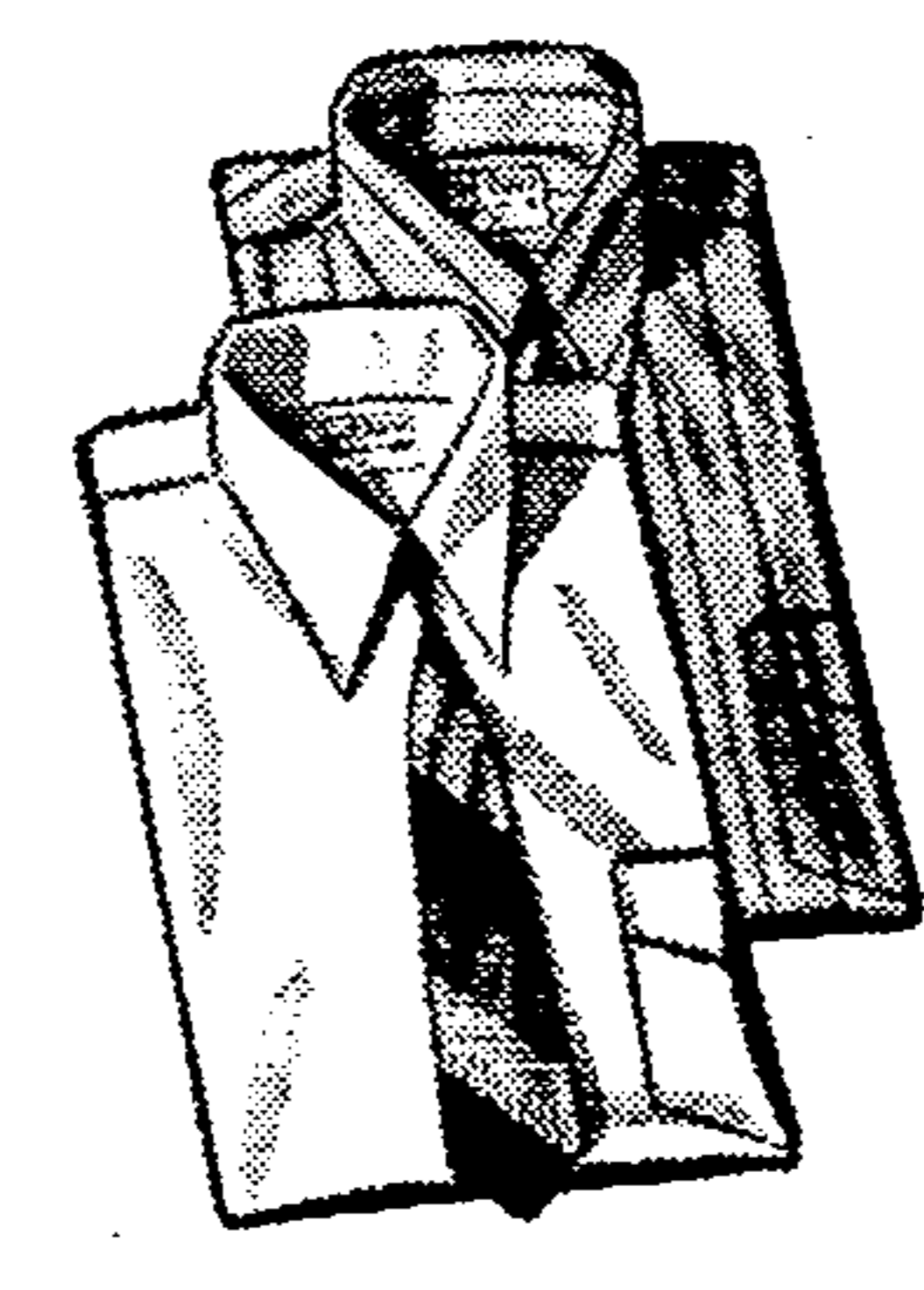

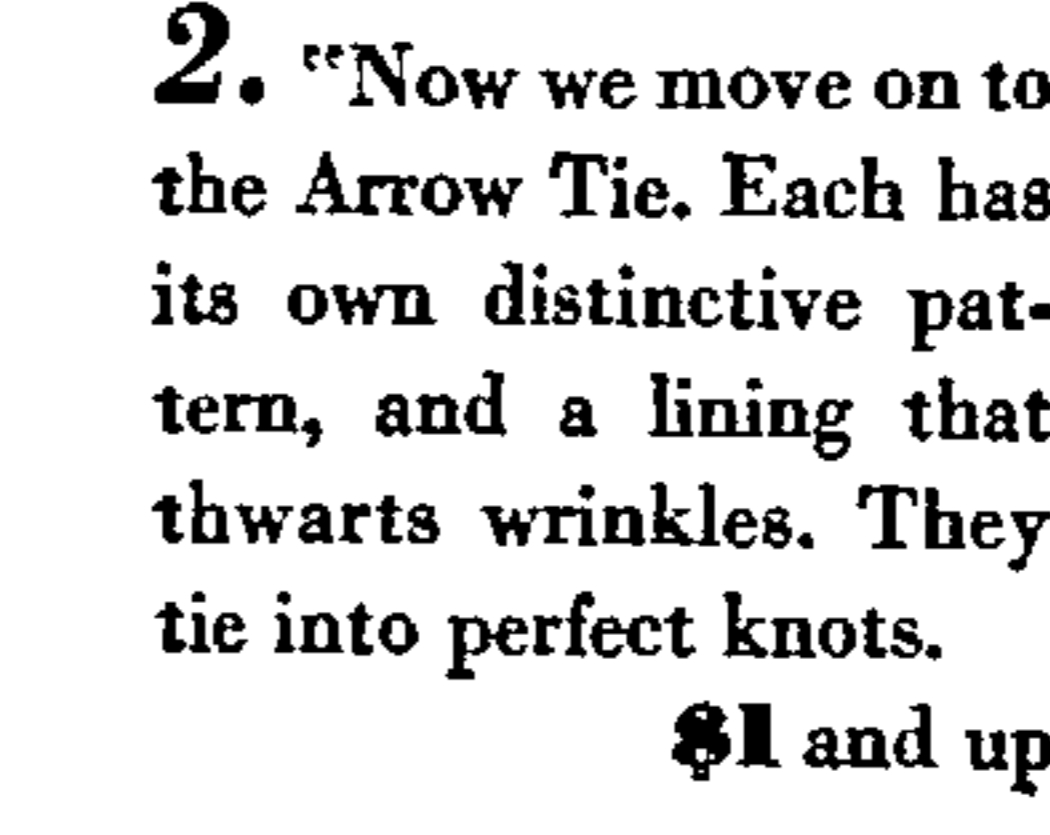

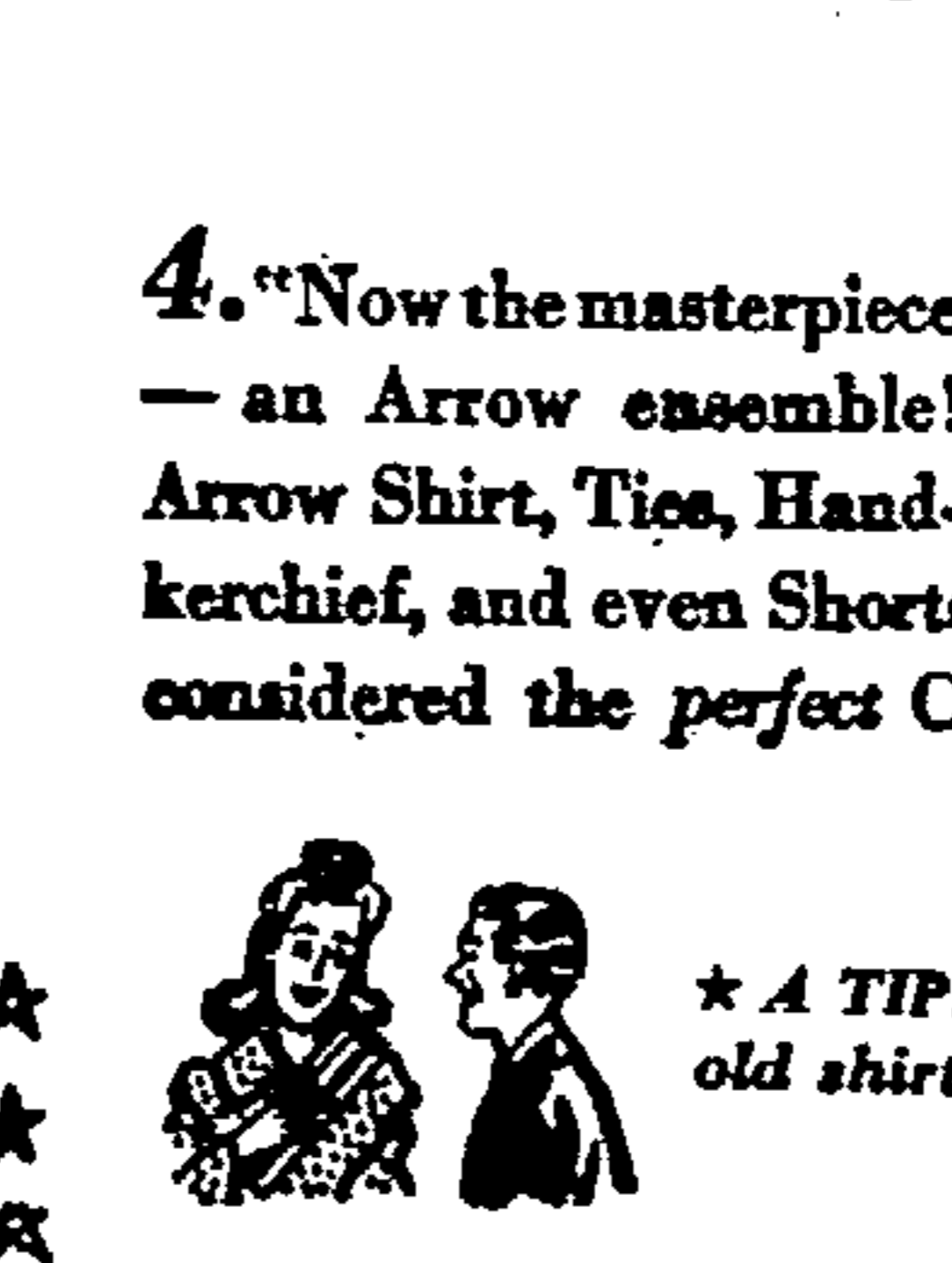

Local Draft Board Designation Registrations

Registrants Who Reached Their Birthday Not Induction.

In an effort to speed up the registration process, the Local Draft Board designated one day group in the Sixth registration in their local area. Those not able to register at the local registration plant will register at the draft board in Wellsville during office hours designated for the registration in their age group.

All registration from 9 a. m. to 5 p. m. on from 9 a. m. until weekdays.

Local registration opened in Andover and Whitesville on December 11, Friday, November 11, 1924. Monday, Dec. 28.

In Andover the registration will be held at the Armory.

The Sixth Registration established as follows:

December 11 to 15, 1942—male persons in the age group born July 1, 1924 to June 30, 1924—Registration in your local community.

December 18 to 22, 1942—male residents born October 31, 1924 to December 31, 1924—Registration held on the 25th.

December 26 to 31, 1942—male residents born December 31, 1924 to January 31, 1925—Registration held on the 28th.

Those born after December 31, 1924 register during registration at the office of the local draft board on the day of the week, except Sunday, when they will register on the following day.

Remember, if you are locally on the draft board during the registration those of you who are not to forward their registration to the Brigadier General New York State Office.
