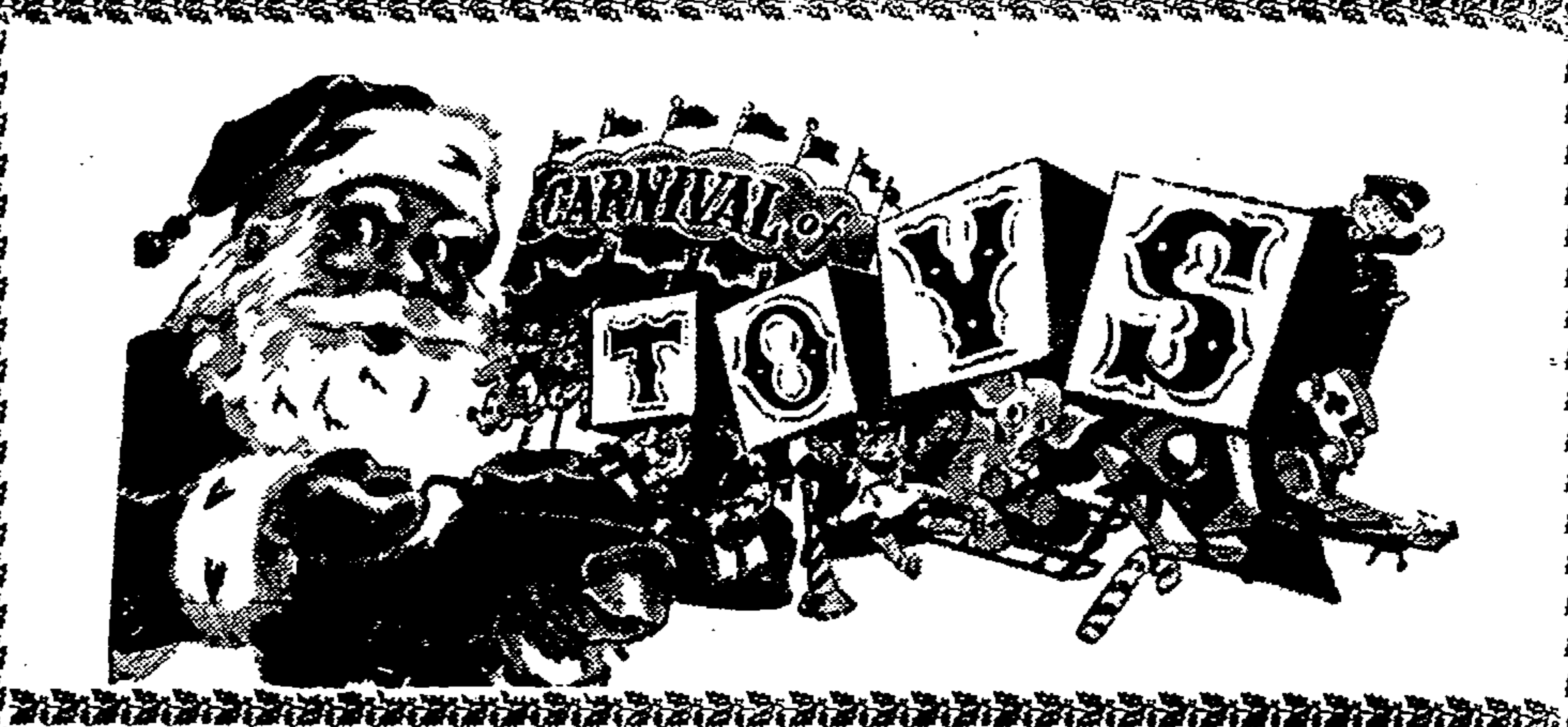

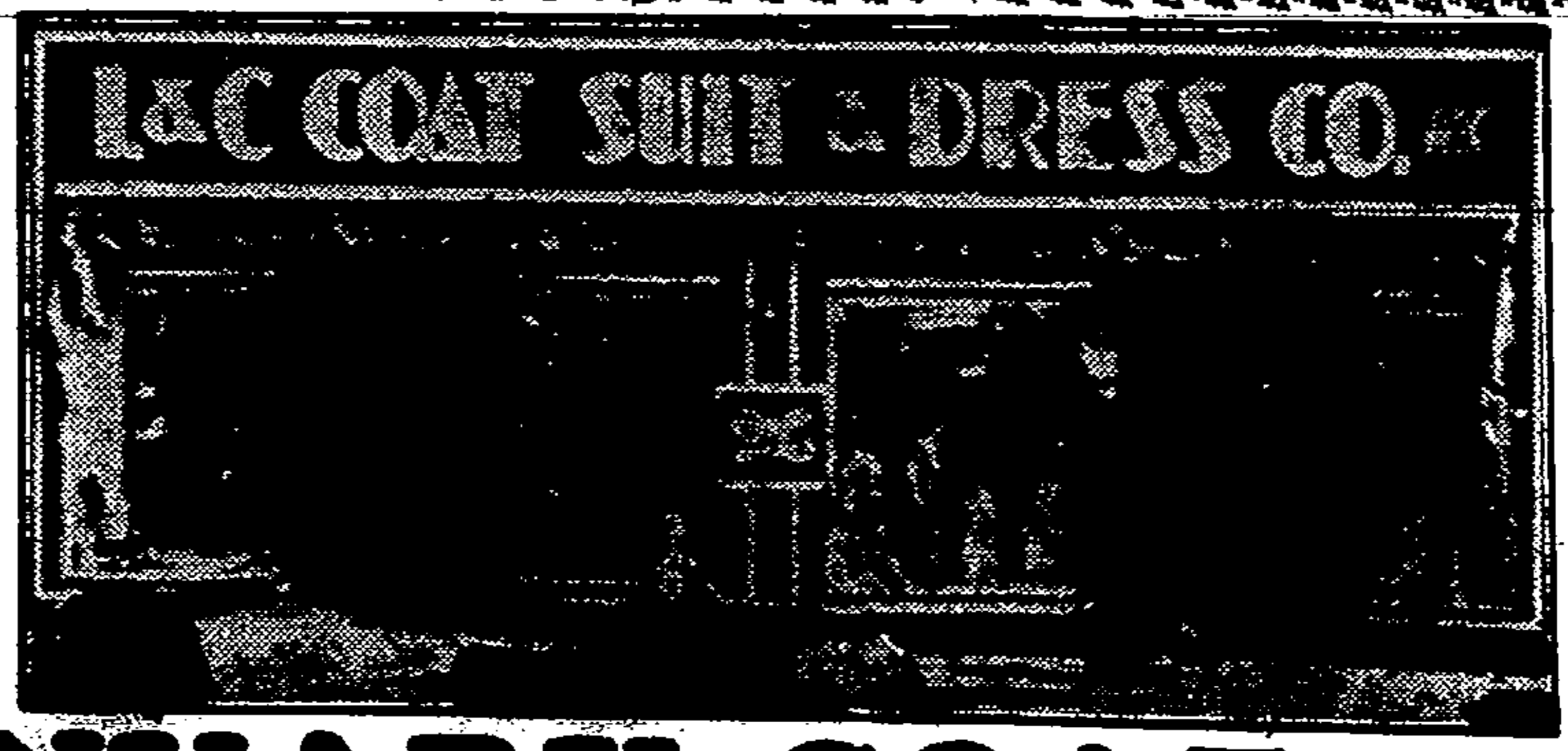

T. R. Bassett Passes From Suddenly
Andover people were shocked Monday morning by the sudden death of T. R. Bassett. Bassett had been in poor health for some time, but had risen in the morning and shaved and walked to the sidewalk. After climbing the steps to his house, he was suddenly stricken.
Thomas Reading Jr. at the Bassett home on Independence May 27, John C. and Elizabeth Bassett and passed from this life in this village morning, Dec. 14, 1942. The young man had moved to Buffalo from Independence where he attended college, after which he spent a year in California. Upon returning to the jeweler's trade he worked at Wilson, N. Y. He operated a general postoffice at Independence time before establishing business in Andover, successfully conducting the business to C. H. Bassett's death. He accepted a Civil Service position at the State laboratory where he remained until returning to Andover to play for a time before retiring to business.
Mr. Bassett was an educated citizen, possessed a position and fine passing is greatly missed by his host of friends.
Dec. 25, 1890, marriage with Miss who with the following survive: Mrs. Elizabeth Bassett, Earl C. Bassett, Mrs. Ralph B. Bassett, Ohio and J. Charles Bassett. A sister, Carpenter of Rochester.
Mr. Bassett united with the Baptist church in 1880, was a loyal and devoted member of that church. Services were held at 11:00 a.m. at the First Baptist church of Andover and Rev. Horn of Alfred officiated at the interment in the cemetery.
