## AROUND OUR HOUSE

### Warmth From Old Garments

With cooler homes this winter  
 due to fuel rationing, many persons  
 need warmer clothes — jackets,  
 sweaters, and jerkins to put on over  
 house dresses; bedjackets to make  
 reading in bed more comfortable;  
 bedsocks, scarves, woolen shirts,  
 and many more articles to help  
 guard against colds and chills.  
 A homemaker can do many things  
 with old or unused clothing to add  
 to her family's comfort. Some old  
 garments can be remade into warm-  
 er, attractive outer garments. Cloth-  
 ing specialists at the New York  
 State College of Home Economics  
 suggest quilted cotton materials for  
 outer garments by putting layer of  
 cotton cloth, and then stitching the  
 thicknesses on the machine in even  
 rows in both directions of the cloth,  
 giving the effect of small squares.  
 Quilted fabrics are especially warm  
 because they have three thicknesses  
 of cloth, and the air incorporated  
 into the garments by the quilting  
 process helps to keep out the cold.  
 Quilted materials make attractive  
 jerkins, bedjackets, house pajamas,  
 and house dresses.

Odd balls of unused yarn can be  
 knitted into sweaters, jerkins, bed  
 socks, and scarves.

Enough material for women's  
 jerkins and jackets can often be  
 salvaged from old skirts and dres-  
 ses. Jackets made from old wool  
 coats are especially warm and can  
 be good-looking too.
