E. O'Dell, ASN 32841207, Corps of Engineers, Company "A". 229th Engineer Combat Battalion, United States Army.—For gallantry in action on the coast of France, 6 June 1944.

Technician Fifth Grade O'Dell, a member of an assault demolition team, landed with the initial assault waves under heavy enemy machine gun, and observed artillery fire. After completing his assigned work in clearing a gap, he moved to a comparatively safe place beneath the dune-line. From there he saw two of his comrades who were wounded and unable to reach any cover. With complete disregard for his personal safety, T-5 O'Dell went on to the open beach and carried one of his comrades to the dune-line. On the next trip he received a shrapnel wound as he carried the other companion to a position of cover behind a tank. These acts saved his two wounded companions from drowning from a rising tide.
