

Farm Youth Receives Bankers' Award

(Insert) The 1944 insignia, made of white felt imprinted in green, are wartime substitutes for the usual gold, silver, and bronze 4-H achievement pins.

To encourage New York State farm youths in projects for the advancement of sound farming methods, the New York State Bankers Association will distribute project achievement emblems to 55,000 New York boys and girls in 55 agricultural counties during the next few weeks, according to George J. Sluyter, chairman of the Association's Committee on Agriculture.

This year's insignia, made up of white felt imprinted in green, are wartime substitutes for the gold, silver, and bronze pins the Association has been awarding each year since 1927. Each achievement award signifies the successful completion of a year of 4-H work in a project supervised and approved by a county 4-H leader.

Since the war, there has been a steady increase in the number of 4-H achievement winners. The 1944 total of 55,000 is more than double the number in 1940 and 5,000 higher than last year. The increase is attributed to greater 4-H Club project activity on the part of farm boys and girls and also, in part, to the large number of city children who have become eligible for achievement awards by raising Victory Gardens and chickens and carrying on home economics projects.

The first New York State 4-H winner to receive his 1944 felt insignia was Leander Glover, 19-yearold Suffolk county farm boy, who was three times winner of first awards for potato growing at the New York State fair and who has just completed his 10th year as a 4-H Club member. Glover, in addition to | managing his 4-H project of five acres of potatoes, is in business with his father on the home farm on which more than 100 acres of Long Island potatoes are grown each year.

The Allegany County Bankers Association sponsors the 4-H Club work each year, with the donating of prizes locally for various 4-H projects.

According to Professor Albert Hoefer, State 4-H Club leader, Cornell University, Ithaca, Glover is "typical of the hundreds of outstanding young farm people in 4-H Club work."
