

### Total Return of \$4.22 Set For October Milk

New York, N. Y., Nov. 14. — Dairy farmers in the six states of the New York milkshed will collect at the record level of \$4.22 a hundredweight for the isecond running month when they are paid for their October de-

The record, a historic peak for the New York milkshed, was set with the payment for milk produced in December 1918 and was never equalled until the price for September 1944 guaranteed the same return.

Equalling the 1918 record for the second month in a row became a certainty when Dr. C. J. Blanford, administrator of the New York metropolitan milk marketing area, announced that the uniform price of October imilk is \$3.42 a hundredweight. Dairy feed payments from the War Food Administration at the minimum rate of 80 cents 'hundredweight assures a total return at the record level.

Dr. Blanford reported that, in addition to matching the all-time high price, dairy farmers bettered all October production records with deliveries at the rate of 268 pounds a day per farm.
