When a person burns his fing er, some of the cells of the finger are kill because the burning protoplasm; so that it is no longer living material. Tissue does not come back to life and can not come back to life but it is replaced by living material in the form of new cells.

The fact that the goldfish, ap-i ald Mullen; Chaplain, Ruth York; Is Just Around the Corner parently, live again after having Meets every second and fourth Meets first and third Monday been frozen is evidence that the freezing was not sufficient to disassociate the material of the protoplasm of which the fish was made and, therefore, the fish was not killed by the freezing.

The same freezing over a longer period might cause death or disassociation of the protoplasm or freezing at a colder temperafreezing reduces the respiration; to a minimum but does not disassociate the protoplasm. — Dr.
