For the Week Ending Thursday, Nov. 23, 1944

In this year of liberation, which has seen so many millions freed from tryrannical rule, it is fitting that we give thanks with special fervor to our heavenly Father for the mercies we have received individually and as a nation and for the blessings He has restored, through the victories of our arms and those of our allies, to His children in other lands.

For the preservation of our way of life from the __. threat of destruction; for the unity of spirit which has kept our nation strong; for our abiding faith in freedom; and for the promise of an enduring peace, we should lift up our hearts in Thanksgiving.

For the harvest that has sustained us and, in its fullness, brought succor to other peoples, for the bounty of our soil, which has produced the sinews of war for the protection of our liberties; and for a multitude of private blessings, known only in our hearts, we should give united thanks to God.

To the end that we may bear more ernest witness to our gratitude to Almighty God, I suggest a nationwide reading of the Holy Scriptures during the period from Thanksgiving Day to Christmas. This plan, which is sponsored nationally and locally by the Legion and the Auxiliary, contemplates that every service man and woman, hospitalized in Army and Navy Station Hospitals, in Convalescent Center and in Veterans Adiministration hospitals in this country, will receive at Christmas time a gift parcel. The parcels are to be given by any one and the Legion and Auxiliary will take the responsibility ot collecting and delivering them. As the plan is worked out, no one will be overlooked, every service man and women in hospitals will be remembered.

For several weeks now the Eddie Cantor broadcasts have carried announcements of this Christmas Gift plan. Andover Post American Legion and Aux. 'iliary will sponsor it in this community. Boxes should be ready for collection not later than Dec. 10th.

The plan as worked out locally is this: Persons wishing to contribute boxes will leave them at the Market Basket or Red & White Stores, on or before Dec. 10. The boxes will be picked up by members of American Legion Post and Auxiliary and delivered to the nearest hospitals which are at Bath and Batavia.
