clude clerk fees. No license can be issued for less than the full license year.

The owner of the dog who fails or refuses to obtain a license for the dog as required by law incurs a penalty of \$10.00 and costs. The enumerators of towns and

the police department of cities are required to prepare in January of this year a list of dog owners. The omission of the name of an owner from the enumerators' or police list will not excuse the owner from obtaining a
