



An unlicensed dog may se seizlease during November totaled "Vell," Cohen replied, "you've ed and killed and the fact that a dog is without a tag is presumtive evidence that the dog is unlicensed.

> Dog licenses must be obtained from the clerk of the city or town where the dog is harbored or kept.

License Fees: Male dog, \$2.25; female dog, \$5.25; spayed female dog, \$2.25. These amounts include clerk fees.

No license can be issued for less than the full license year.

The owner of the dog who fails or refuses to obtain a license for the dog as required by law incurs a penalty of \$10.00 and costs.

The enumerators of towns and the police department of cities are required to prepare in January of this year a list of dog owners. The omission of the name of an owner from the enumerators' or police list will not excuse the owner from obtaining a
