Question 4. What is drumlin? ANSWER. A drumlin is a type of hill of which there are many hundred in Central New York. These drumlins are oval shaped hills a few score yards up to several hundred feet in height, a few hundred yards up to a mile

or more in length.

They were formed by the great continental ice sheet which pushed down from Canada some few thousand years ago, and in passing over the region where Lake Ontario now is piled mixed masses of sand and ground-up DAIRYMEN'S LEAGUE rocks and boulders into the forms which we now find. The oval shaped hills which are so- conspicuous between Syracuse and Rochester are largely drumlins or glacially formed hills. — Dr. Apfel.
