### G. L. F. Sponsors New Building at Cornell

Ithaca, N. Y. —Stating that "farmers of the Northeast have a mutual interest with industry and labor in a better diet for the one-third of the country's population living in the Northeastern United States," the directors of the Cooperative Grange League Federation Exchange have appropriated \$200,000 to Cornell University, toward the erection of a headquarters for the Cornell School of Nutrition.

The School of Nutrition, set up as the first of its kind in America, June 16, 1942, has no building of its own, using the facilities of other Cornell departments.

The G. L. F. directors stipulated that \$100,000 "is to be available on call by the University, and the second \$100,000 to be made available over a period of not to exceed four years."

The G. L. F. Board recommended that the headquarters building it is providing be named Savage Hall in memory of the late Professor E. S. Savage, whose leadership was largely responsible for the establishment of the School of Nutrition.
