Mono-sodium glutamate is a salt of one of the many so-called amino acids which are produced when either animal or vegetable protein is broken down chemically—as it is, for example, in the digestive processes.

Commercially, it is made from wheat or soy bean proteins, animal protein such as lean meat or fish are equally good as a source. The Buddists, however, will use only that which has a vegetable origin.

It is a white soluble powder with a distinctive meatlike flavor. This flavor is exceedingly intense. It requires fifteen times as much sugar as mono-solium glutamate in a cup of water to be preceptible to the taste... This does not mean that it is sweet, but only that its tasto is intense and therefore very little is required to flavor the food.

Its value is somewhat decreased by use of an excess of salt or vinegar in the food so that its value may be lost to one with a heavy hand on the salt shaker. am not sure that it is generally available as yet on the market but expect it will be soon .- Dr. Aden. King, chamist.

Question 2. Are seedless oranges really seedless? If so, how to they keep the species growing?

ANSWER. Some varieties of oranges are seedless. Many plants do not produce seeds. The orchard grower, takes twigs from trees and grows plants from the twigs, or parts of the plant take root. In fact, he might not get such good oranges from seeds. If you buy oranges labelled seedlešš you may find a few seeds in the oranges, but most oranges have a great many seeds and "scedless" is to relative state ment.—Dr. Ernest Reed, gen-
