July Milk Earns Producers \$3.73

Dairy farmers in the New York milkshed will share a record income from a record production when they collect later this month for the milk delivered in July.

The records were revealed when Dr. C. J. Blanford, administrator of the New York metropolitan milk marketing area, posted a uniform price of \$3.18 a hundredweight for July production. The uniform price, combined with the incentive payment from the United States Department of Agriculture at the lesser of 55 and 65-cent rates applying in the six-state metropolitan milkshed, means that producers will receive a total of \$3.37 a hundredweight. The total is the highest return ever collected for July milk, according to payments dating from 1910.

The administrator's pool report disclosed that producers will be paid for a total of 614,168,048 pounds of milk. The intake, received at 442 plants, is the largest ever delivered in July. The record production bettered the receipts of July 1944 by nearly 11 per cent and outdistanced the previous high of nearly 573 million pounds in July 1942 by more than 41 million pounds.

The record production, figured at the record return of \$3.73, means that producer income from July milkings will reach a record top. The yield is now figured at \$23,339,894.48 with the USDA production payments included at the lower rate. The yield also includes butterfat and location payments worth in excess of \$430,000.
