



Harland W. Chidsey, 21, of Penn Yan, receives a 17-jewel gold watch from Thomas E. Wilson, Chicago, for having the highest rating state record in the National 4-H Meat Animal award program. During nine years in club work the boy handled 116 hogs. He won many placings on his meat animal exhibits, including \$152.00 in cash prizes, which brought his total estimated income from all 4-H projects to \$5,497.00. He has developed an excellent herd of purebred Yorkshire hogs, the offspring of a Yorkshire sow awarded him by the Penn Yan Kiwanis Club in 1941.

George Newman, 16, of Rensselaer Falls, has been named an Eastern section winner of a Chicago Club Congress trip in the National 4-H Victory Garden Activity, awards in which are provided by the Sears-Roebuck Foundation. His 4-H record shows that he raised a total of two acres of garden during seven years of club work. With the help of his younger brother, George planted and cared for the family garden, some of the products of which they sold. George won many placings on exhibits, including \$193.25 in cash prizes. Seven state co-winners also receive a \$25 U.S. Savings Bond each.

Ernest Young, 17, of Cortland, won an Eastern section award of a Chicago Club Congress trip in the National 4-H Dairy Production Activity. During nine years in club work the boy developed an outstanding herd of Holsteins which returned him \$8,635.00, including \$135.00 in cash prizes. He exhibited the reserve champion over all breeds at the Cortland County fair. Ernest placed second in the sectional 4-H demonstration contest That year and first in the state this year. His 4-H experiences have greatly improved the dairy feeding and management practices on his farm. State co-winners in two classes each receive a \$25 Savings Bond from the Kraft Foods Company.

Robert Fullagar, 17, of Penn Yan, has been chosen to represent the state to compete for sectional award in the Firestone LH, Soil Conservation Activity. His achievement. during the last four of his eight years in club work include laying out 50 acres on the contour for strip cropping with strips 100 feet wide. This has eliminated damage from water erosion on these fields. Recause of an tegressed number of livestock, the pasture was enlarged and seeded to clover and alfalfa. A Desture rotation also increased the carrying capacity. Robert also planted 1,000 red pine and spruce as well as 500 ash. A long time conservation program is being put into effect on his ferm. Five state co-winners also each receive a \$50 U.S. Savings Bond.

The sectional award is an all-expense trip
